## WITHDRAW AMERICAN TROOPS.

Shall American troops be withdrawn from the Rhine as an evidence of the determination of the United States to refrain from further European alliance?

Representative Fish' of New York, a Republican, says so in the following resolution:

"Whereas peace has gone between Germany and the United States through cessation of hostilities and by the passage by Congress of a resolution, signed by the President, declaring a State of peace; and

"Whereas the continuance of American troops in Germany is a great burden to the taxpayer of the United States, who are now supporting our troops there by reason of the non-payment by Germany of the expenses of said troops; and

"Whereas the continued maintenance of our troops in Germany since the enforced disarmament of that nation is contrary to our traditional foreign policy; and

"Whereas the withdrawal of our troops from Germany will hasten and promote the resumption of commercial and diplomatic intercourse with the German people; and

"Whereas the Constitution of United States provided that Congress shall have power to make rules for the government of and naval forces: Now therefore be it

"Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate concurring). That Congress exercise its constitutional power and that all American troops in the Army of Occupation in Germany be ordered forthwith to the United States of America, and the commander-in-Chief of the Army and navy of the United States is hereby requested to carry out the purpose of this resolution."

## PUTTING CHRIST INTO EDUCATION

Danger of America Sinking Below Germany's Level, if Christ is Left Out.

"Christian education is the salvation of this country, and in order to bring this about our educational system must be centered around Jesus Christ," said Rev. J. Stewart French, D. D. president of Emory and Henry and Martha Washington colleges in speaking in behalf of the Christian education movement of this denomination.

"If this country continues for the next fifty years as it has for the last five years," continue Dr. French. "There will be no such a thing as private property rights in America." He said that if he were a man of wealth, and even though he were not interested in education as a Christian man, he would give most liberally of the fund for the promotion of Christian education, for the sole purpose, if for no other, of protecting the remainder of his wealth from invasion and destruction by elements that are today seeking the downfall of this republic.

"If our nation does not find Christ, and give Christian education to our boys and girls of the present and the future America will sink into a wreckage that will be even deeper and greater and more destructive than the moral wreckage of the German people," he continued.

Dr. French spoke of the widespread campaign in behalf of socialism. He said that in thirty-four of the leading universities of America, clubs are actually maintained that have for their expressed purpose the leading of socialism and the spreading socialistic propaganda. This he deprecated as an omen that is not for the good of America, and said it could be wholly overcome only through the means of Christian education.

The Statement of Dr. French is among the forthcoming solicitation for \$33,000,000 throughout the M. E. church, south, which fund the church purposes to raise to promote the cause of Christian education.

The canvass for the fund will be made May 29 to June 5 inclusive, Holston conference's quota is \$1,705,000.

## LAMB MEAT IS DELICIOUS FOOD

Sheep Growers Urge Eating Of Much Mutton—Big Production

## SHOULD BUTCHER THEM RIGHT

Placing Roast Legs on Picnic Tables Spreads Demand—Those Eating Greatly Pleased and Sent in Orders.

Eat more lamb meat. The people of Tennessee have so long been accustomed to the eating of hog meat and beef that they have overlooked the value of lamb and mutton.

Sheep growers particularly are calling attention to the value of lamb because of the fact that it is a delicious meat, and because there is an over-production.

Lambs, to make the best food should be fattened quickly thru the use of the widest variety of feeds. They must be butchered right, that is case skinned, and neither the hands nor the wool should be allowed to touch the carcass while it is still warm.

To prepare, split the carcass down the middle with a saw, and divide in halves, into quarters, leaving two short ribs on the rear quarter.

Mutton trade has been developed as a result of taking roast mutton to picnics, July 4th celebrations, and to other holiday gatherings.

Why Tennessee people have not developed the mutton-eating habit is rather mysterious. They just have not is about the only answer. One of the divisions of extension specialists remarked the other day that a short time ago he ordered a mutton steak when he could not buy beef or pork, and that he was so much pleased that he has continued eating this kind of meat instead of the others.

Sheep owners can increase the demand for mutton by boosting at all times the pleasing taste of this meat. Placing nice mutton roasts on picnic tables is one of the best ways to spread the desire for this sort of meat. If the demand becomes large, as it should if a boosting campaign is carried on, the industry will be greatly aided.

## CREOSOTE PRESERVES SOFT WOOD FENCE POSTS

Creosote treatment about doubles the life of the woods ordinarily used for fence posts. Many species, almost valueless untreated, may be made to last 25 or more years. Treatment may be done with a small tank or iron barrel in which the creosote can be heated. Tests show that the life of posts may be lengthened as follows: Ash from 6 years untreated to 25 years treated; boxelder from 4 to 20 years; white cedar from 14 to 30 years; catalpa from 17 to 20 years; cottonwood from 3 to 27 years; soft maple from 4 to 27 years.

## BANK THIEF SUSPECTS TRAILED BY HOUNDS

Capture Leads to Recovery of \$101,600 in Stolen Bonds.

RUSSELLVILLE, Ky., May 12.—Trailed by bloodhounds, two men believed to have held up the G. W. Davidson & Co. private bank at Auburn, Ky. where captured by a posse on the bank of Mud River in Muhlenberg County a wild section thirty miles north of here. The men carried \$3,000 in gold and currency. They offered no resistance.

Capture of the men was preceded by the discovery of \$101,900 in bonds—the amount stolen—buried near the home of Vivian Thompson at Bald Knob Church in Logan County. Thompson according to the officers, admitted that his brother, Boyd and a man whose name he gave as Smith planned and executed the robbery. Bloodhounds secured from the penitentiary at Nashville and placed on the trail, followed the throuth the night.

The robbery netted, besides the bonds, about \$9,400 in cash. The men entered the bank at noon and while one guarded at the door the other compelled the bookkeeper to open the vault. Seizing the bonds and cash, they bound and gagged the bookkeeper. A half hour later posses were searching for them.
