# Snow and Cold No Bar to Growing Vegetables

Raise a winter war garden. Just because snow and cold are coming is no reason why growing of vegetables should cease. One Memphis business man has solved the problem of winter vegetables. On a lot in North Memphis is a space 10 feet square, solidly covered with glass. Old windows did the trick. They were fastened over a hole in the ground four feet deep. The hole was once the beginning of a cellar. In that hole, no matter what the temperature outside, you will find onions, radishes, beans, tomatoes, parsnips, turnips, in fact almost any kind of vegetable that does not grow too high.

But the winter garden plan is not the only gardening innovation for which this man is responsible. Here is one that combines profit and beauty. By taking an old barrel and boring it full of holes six inches apart, puncturing a stovepipe with a series of holes, placing the stovepipe in the barrel, filling the barrel with earth and the stovepipe with manure, one has the framework for an aerial strawberry garden. Strawberry plants are placed in the holes, and, through filling the stovepipe with water, the plants are given moisture. The result is a complete covering of the barrel with green strawberry plants and the bearing of delicious berries. Four such barrels during the summer supplied the gardener's family of four with berries the entire season.

## WILSON'S REPLY MEETS APPROVAL OF ALLIED PRESS

London and Paris Newspapers Express Quiet Satisfaction at Firmness of Note to Germany.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The popular comment on the president's note here is that it contains the strongest language ever addressed by the head of one great nation to another in modern times. The note is welcomed, first, because it brings matters to a new state; further proceedings, if there are to be further proceedings, will be in the hands of all the governments interested. Hitherto, so far as the public knows, the nations associated with the United States, and which have more at stake perhaps than has the United States, have been onlookers to the correspondence.

Police Hopes Are Blasted; Workhouse Doesn't Cure Fiends. Police officials, who were led to believe they had found at the Shelby county workhouse a remedy for perishing drug addicts in Memphis, have had their fondest hopes blasted. For several weeks they went under the hallucination that drug addicts were being cured there. A few days ago an addict, discharged after serving his sentence at the workhouse, voluntarily penned a letter to Turnkey Joe Cole, thanking him and the police department for sending him to the workhouse. He said a 30-day sojourn had been the greatest blessing of his life in that it cured him of the drug habit.

## PARIS SEES HOPE

PARIS, Oct. 25.—President Wilson's reply to Germany was published by the newspapers here in English as well as in a French translation at the request of the authorities. La Liberté says that if Germany gives guarantees as demanded by the president it will be materially impossible for her to continue the war. "Every thing is now in the hands of the military," says the Temps. "The reply has moved the problem from the domain of controversy to the domain of facts. The president attaches such importance to the essential idea that an armistice is impossible in Germany to return the war that he expresses it three times."

## CITIZENS OF FRISCO MUST WEAR MASKS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—An ordinance compelling the wearing of face masks by every person in San Francisco, as a means of preventing the spread of the influenza epidemic, was passed today by the board of supervisors at the request of the board of health. Penalties for violation are fines ranging from \$5 to \$100, or 10 days imprisonment, or both.

## ALLIED FORCES IN VOLOGDA VICTORIOUS

ARCHANGEL, Oct. 25.—The Russian allied expedition which sailed from the shores of the Arctic and thence down the Mezen and Vashka rivers, reached the district of Vologda, in the province of Vologda. They were joined by forces of the Zyrjan tribes inhabiting the local region, and drove out the Bolsheviks in this section. This was the first victory for allied forces in Vologda.

## CLAIMS CZARINA GAVE TIP TO KILL KITCHNER

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Information which made it possible for German submarines to sink the vessel on which Lord Kitchener was lost was furnished to the German government by the former Russian czarina, according to an assertion made here by Henry W. Messer, Salvation Army commissioner, who has just returned from Russia. Mr. Messer declared he learned in Russia that the czarina maintained a private wire line with her apartments at the winter palace in Petrograd, over which she transmitted to the German government all information in regard to the military plans of the allies which was received by Russia as an ally.

## PUBLISHER DEAD

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 25.—William H. Murray, publisher of the Minneapolis Tribune, died Thursday in Chicago, aged 75. He purchased the Minneapolis Tribune in 1887 and since has been its sole owner and publisher.
