

Veritable Forecast.

The above paragraphs, read in the light of America's enforced entry into the European war because of a transgression of neutral rights on the high seas, constitute a remarkable foreast found themselves in the early periods of this war when German autocracy obeyed no rules of civilized warfare and not only violated sacred rights of the sea, but compelled Great Britain and France to take steps for their own protection, which did not correspond to their own trdaitional views on the subject of neutral rights.

Indeed, the freedom of the seas, so far as war time is concerned, should never be a cause for friction between the United States and Great Britain, because the American delegation probably would not ask for anything more than the declaration made by Great Britain through her delegates' to the second Hague peace conference, as follows:

"In order to lessen the difficulties encountered by neutral commerce in the time of war, the government of his Brittanic majesty is ready to abandon the principle of contraband in case of war between the powers which may sign a convention to this end. The right of search shall be exercised only in order to determine the neutral character of a merchant ship."

The above states the principle of the "freedom of the seas," for war time, as well as anything that has been said on the subject in the past, and the idea meets with favor here because it is believed nations will not be so quick to engage in war if the beligerents are to be estopped from interfering with the transport of supplies or private property of all kisds. Just as America insisted at the second Hague conference on a reduction of armaments as a means of preventing war, so does the president believe that by reducing the opportunity of one nation to strangle another by boycotts or blockades, will all nations be compelled to see the futility of armed combat as a means of settling disputes and the necessity of submitting their cases to a court of arbitration or league of nations and abiding by the decisions of rebundle wherein international morality and justice shall be paramount.

#### COTTONSEED PRICE TO BE STABILIZED

Regulations for deductions from cot

Regulations for deductions from cotton seed prices because of damage, immaturity and foreign matter have been laid down by the food administration, according to a notice from State Food Administrator Morgan to all county tood administrators.

The notice reads:

"As a part of the stabilization program recommended by the cotton seed producers and accepted by the United States food administration, the cotton seed industry section has formulated a standard plan regarding dockage for damaged seed, as follows:

"No deduction may be made for foreign matter except when such foreign matter is in excess of 1 per cent of the total weight."

"Deduction in excess of 1 per cent may be made for actual weight of such excess on a basis of the delivered price of the seed.

"No deduction shall be made for damaged or immature seed except for damage or immature seed except for damage or immature seed except for damage or immature is damaged or im-

mage or immaturity in excess of 1 r cent.

"Any deduction for damaged or in ature seed in excess of 10 per cent all be at the rate of not more that i per cent per ton for each 1 per cent such damaged or immature seed." SIX NATCHEZ NEGROES




