NEW WAY TO SECURE GLYCERINE IS SUCCESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Chemists in government employ have developed a new synthetic process of making glycerine by fermentation of sugar at low cost, which officials say will revolutionize production. This secret, carefully guarded while the war lasted, was disclosed in a treasury report.

TWO FRENCH VESSELS AND 80 MEN MISSING

SAILT STE. MARIE, Mich., Dec. 5.—Two French mine sweepers and their crews, numbering about 80 men, are believed to have been lost in one of the severe storms that have swept over Lake Superior in the last two weeks. Three boats left Fort Williams, Ont., where they were built for the French government, on Nov. 23, and but one has arrived at Kingston, Ont. No word has been received from the others for over a week. The vessels, which were bound overseas, were 16 feet long and carried four-inch guns fore and aft.
