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RECORDED BY PHONOGRAPH "LAND BATTERY"

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—America's famous land battery of 4-inch guns, which played so important a part in the German defeat, was described for the first time in detail by Lieutenant-Commander C. Buell, of the naval reserve, at the annual meeting here of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

The seven guns of the battery, he said, were built in 1917 for use on battleships. They fired a 1,000-pound projectile at a muzzle velocity of 2,800 feet per second and had an extreme range of nearly 30 miles.

The project of putting them on the movable railway carriages for use in France, he said, was first conceived in the spring of 1918. The first mount was completed at the Baldwin Locomotive works April 25, just 12 days after the bids were opened and 20 days ahead of schedule, and the last one was delivered 30 days later. The guns were tested at Sandy Hook and shipped from Philadelphia with their crews and trains comprising 25 cars to France.

Lieutenant-Commander Buell said the train was sent to the front, and the guns were first used on Sept. 25, less than 250 days after the plan was first conceived. The guns, which had the longest range of any ever mounted on a movable carriage, were so successful in mobility and accuracy of fire that six more were ordered. The armament was stored, however, before they were delivered.

The crews were recruited from the Great Lakes naval station and were made up of men, all of whom had railway experience.

Lieutenant-Commander William L. Cathcart, in an address on the American fleet, said it had an aggregate horsepower of 6,000,000 last June.

Completion of ships now under construction would, he said, increase the present horsepower of the navy 10 per cent.

TELLS STORY OF MURDER OF WHOLE ROMANOFF FAMILY

LONDON, Dec. 5.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam says the Kiev newspapers publish a story by the Count of the Romanoff family by the Bolshetki. According to this story, the once royal family was compelled to live in a single room of a convent at Ekaterinburg for weeks before the murder, under guard of Bolshevik soldiers, who insulted them shamefully.

The valet said on July 17 all the members of the family were taken to the cellar of the convent and placed against the wall and shot, one after the other. According to the story, the murderers cranted the last request of the former Emperor Nicholas, that his wife, who was ill, should die in his arms.

According to the valet, the Grand Duchess Tatiana was only wounded by the shots of the riflemen and was killed by blows from their rifle butts. All the bodies were buried in the outskirt of Ekaterinburg.

LAST PROCLAMATION OF CROWN PRINCE GIVEN

COPIENHAGEN, Dec. 5. (By the Associated Press.)—The German crown prince's last proclamation announcing that his resignation from his command was accepted by the emperor's resignation, and thanking the troops for their heroism and self-sacrifice, is published by the Danische Rundschau of Berlin. In his proclamation, Frederick William, who is now interned on the island of Wilhelmshaven, having fled to Holland, says:

BIG HOTEL IS ASSIGNED TO AMERICAN DELEGATES

PARIS, Dec. 5.—Quarters for Secretary Lansing and the other American delegates to the peace conference have been assigned at the Carlton hotel, the Place de la Concorde. This large hotel has been divided into suites of rooms for the delegates. Each suite will comprise living quarters and a business office for each delegate and an immediate secretary. The apartments overlook the Esplanade de la Concorde, which is now filled with an air fleet as being effected by pleasure. The Germans are shedding their wings in the course of retreat and the advancing allies are picking them up.

PARIS FILLED UP AND PRICES GO SOARING

PARIS, Dec. 5.—Paris is filled to overflowing with soldiers and officers since the requisitioning of 25 hotels for peace conference purposes, has caused a very serious shortage of hotels. Food in restaurants and prices generally are similarly mounting. A breakfast of coffee, bread and butter continues to cost between \$1 and \$1.50 at hotels. It is virtually impossible to lunch at a hotel for less than three or four dollars for a simple meal. People arriving in the city frequently go to the hotels and find no room for which the owners demand large sums and refuse to lower their rates, saying they can get no more.

The city is becoming more crowded daily, with the bulk of the conference officials and others interested in getting ready for the opening of the peace conference. The world's newspaper correspondents and other news gatherers are finding accommodations nobody in Paris knows. In addition to all the other arrivals, the army and navy of all the armies are coming to Paris to leave in considerable numbers. Sometimes as many as 200 officers and men of all the armies are staying in the hotels in front of hotel offices waiting for somebody to leave when they all demand accommodations.

FUEL CHIEF'S AID TO PLANTS IS WITHDRAWN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—All requisitions of the fuel administration for the shipment of bituminous coal to industrial plants have been canceled. The administration announced today that its policy in the future will be to leave to the plants themselves the work of obtaining fuel, which it is believed can be accomplished without difficulty.

FORMER RULER REFUSES TO TALK; FEARS TRIAL

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 5. (By the Associated Press.)—The former German emperor, Kaiser Wilhelm, refused to make any statement whatever for publication in the Netherlands.

This was the former German emperor's message to the Associated Press, which was published in a private edition, and while it would not make any statement whatever for publication in the Netherlands.

"I am very sorry that I cannot say more," he said. "I am very sorry that I cannot say more."

The former emperor and empress are leading a quiet life in the Netherlands. They are not allowed to see any of their family and other relatives, just as the ordinary country folk.

LONDON PAPER SHOWS "ABDICATION" A FARSE

LONDON, Dec. 5. (British Wireless Service.)—The Times in discussing the former German emperor's act of renunciation, points out that there is no evidence to show whether his abdication is legal and valid.

"Moreover, the only effect of the emperor's abdicating under the Prussian constitution is to make the crown prince king of Prussia, and therefore the emperor may do as he pleases, provided he does not do anything that would be a breach of the Prussian constitution, and until that is settled, the emperor's renunciation is not valid."

"But these rights would be still suspended, not abolished, whatever the emperor may do, say, and should a monarchical counter-revolution break out he could, presumably, change his mind and resume his throne. These are points of great practical importance, and if the Germans made up their minds to rid of the emperor, it is highly desirable that they should see no time in settling the deposition of the Hohenzollerns in legal form."

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The University of Ghent has decided to confer the degree of doctor on President Wilson, Premier Clemenceau, Premier Lloyd George, Marshal Foch, Marshal Joffre, Admiral Sir David Beatty, and Admiral Lord Fisher, and Cardinal Mercier.

HINDENBURG TELLS TROOPS OF LANDS TO BE GIVEN THEM

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 5.—The Berlin Tages Zeitung, of Monday, says that Field Marshal Hindenburg addressed the following proclamation to his troops:

"The preliminary work for a land settlement on a big scale is in progress and will be pushed forward as rapidly as the shortage of coal and of building materials will permit. The returning warriors will first receive the thanks of the country for more than four years' work in a thousand battles, in which they were unbroken."

Hundreds of thousands of buildings will be erected on cheaply acquired land with public money loaned at low rates to farmers, gardeners and country artisans. Houses will be built for workers, employes and officials belonging to secondary occupations and transferred to them on the payment of a moderate portion of the actual costs. Only have patience a little while. Help the wounded, the orphaned and the widowed. Save it again by German manly discipline and order, and thus make your own future—and your own, happiness."

SLAIN MAN'S HAND SHOWS WAY TO BODY

RUPELEY, Miss., Dec. 5. (Sul.)—The hand of Ira Short, 36, residing near Walnut, Miss., directed searchers to its hidden body in a creek after a week's futile search. Short had been shot and his throat cut.

Two neighbors, with whom Short had a difficulty, are being held in jail as Short's slayers. It is believed the man was slain about Monday a week ago. He was shot with a shotgun, the charge entering his mouth and coming out at the top of his head.

Relatives had almost abandoned the search when, as if beckoning them on to average the crime, the hand above the water was protruded by passers-by. The negroes in custody, George Starrett and Alton Spaid, are being carefully guarded.

COTTON GIN AT HOXIE IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

HOXIE, Ark., Dec. 5. (Sp.)—Fire last night destroyed the Modern Gin and Hoxie Handle factory adjacent, entailing a loss estimated at \$15,000. The origin is unknown. No arson was lost.
