HIGH OFFICIAL OF I. C. RAILROAD DIES

Thomas J. Foley, Well Known in Memphis, Succumbs to Short Illness.

Railroad officials in Memphis were apprized Tuesday of the death in Chicago Monday night after a short illness of Thomas J. Foley, general manager of the Illinois Central railroad under the federal administration. Prior to his death, Mr. Foley was vice-president in charge of operation and construction of the Illinois central prior to its administration by the government.

Mr. Foley was well known in Memphis, having several times visited here and generally recognized among his business associates as a most capable railway official. As vice-president of the Illinois Central, he was largely concerned in local improvements attendant upon his administration, although he maintained offices in Chicago.

In 1901 he was named assistant to the general manager of the R. & O. railroad, and in 1904 was made general superintendent, which position he held until 1905.

He was then made chief dispatcher for 1906 and 1907 for the Union Pacific railroad, and from 1907 to 1910 was assistant superintendent. From 1910 to 1912 he was assistant general manager of the Illinois Central railroad and was elevated to the position of general manager of this road on Nov. 13, 1912. Since July, 1917, he had been vice-president in charge of operation maintenance and construction of the Illinois Central.

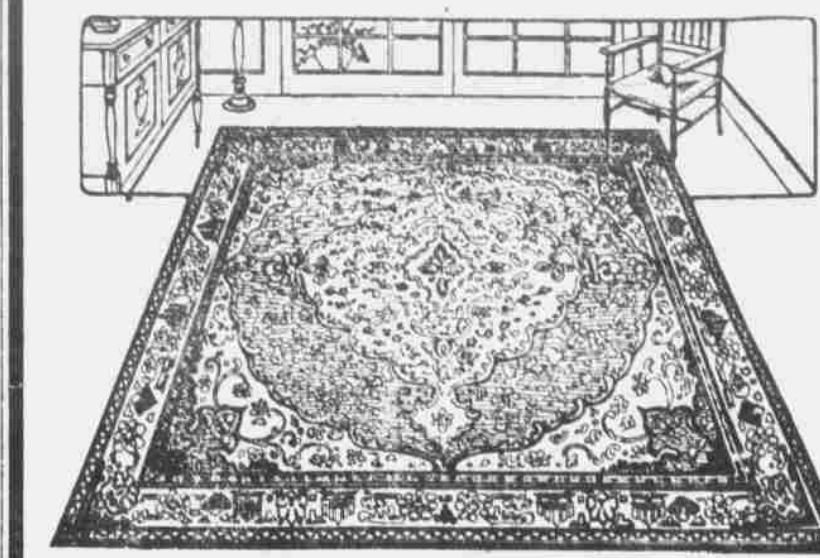
POPLAR AVENUE OIL STATION AGAIN ROBBED
