DEMOCRATIC TICKET CARRIES JACKSON COUNTY BY INCREASED MAJORITY--REPUBLICAN DISTRICTS FALL INTO LINE. TOTAL FOR WILSON 1507.

In Tuesday's election the Democratic ticket carried Jackson county by an increased majority over two and four years ago. Three Republican districts, the first, second and fourth fell into line line, given majorities for the Democratic tickets. The following is the total vote of each candidate:

State's County Agents Hold Annual Meeting.

Reports From Middle Tennessee Points To Much Valuable Farm Demonstration Work.

Knoxville, Tenn., Nov. 4, 1916.

Fifty farm demonstration agents from all parts of the State, meeting here in the library of the University of Tennessee, closed their annual session with a statement of plans for the coming year. More live stock suited to the conditions of the individual counties will be encouraged. Community meetings will be held to discuss affairs of the county and for the purpose of getting acquainted. Farmers will be assisted in their crop rotations in order that all counties in Tennessee may build up their soils.

Several counties have just employed agents, and these men have had the benefit of the discussions and reports at this annual meeting. Farm demonstrations are one part of the extension work in agriculture carried on by the cooperation of the U. S. department of Agriculture, the College of Agriculture of the University of Tennessee, the State Board of Education and several other organizations. Once each year the entire field force meet at Knoxville to make their reports and to discuss plans for the future.

H. D. Tate, state leader of county agents, presided at the sessions and brought before the county agents, because of his thorough training and experience many valuable suggestions. Reports were made by the agents for their counties and by the district agents for their sections of Tennessee. H. S. Nichols is the district agent for West Tennessee, J. M. Dean for Middle Tennessee and D. T. Hardin for East Tennessee.

Middle Tennessee has made much progress during the past year, according to the report of Mr. Dean. He points to the fact that where there were only 12 county agents, 597 demonstrators, 575 cooperators and 224 corn club boys last year, there are now 18 county agents, 877 demonstrators, 630 cooperators and 556 corn club boys. These men and boys are all working definitely to improve agricultural conditions in their communities. One purpose of the work during the past year has been to bring in more live stock and to improve soil conditions. Crop rotations have been changed in many cases in

order that the farmer might utilize his labor to the best advantage, that he might secure more money for the same work on his farm, and in the end have a more fertile soil than in the beginning. While dry weather has interfered with the planting of legumes yet, because of the application of lime to many farms, legumes have been made possible where before they could not be grown.

Mr. Dean commented upon the fact that an increasing number of lime pulverizing machines have been brought into Middle Tennessee, and spoke of the benefit his part of the state has received from the lime supplied by the N. C. & St. L. Railway to the farmers along its lines.

One hundred and ninety-seven pure bred bulls, 412 pure bred heifers, 509 pure bred hogs and 134 jacks and stallions have been brought into Middle Tennessee to improve farm live stock. Special interest is being shown in beef cattle, since Middle Tennessee is especially favored in soil and climate for the production of beef. Dairying is developing and the cooperatives creameries are helping farmers to market their products. Mr. Dean spoke of the fact that real cooperative creameries afford the farmers a market for their products at the best prices, while privately owned creameries, organized for the sole purpose of making profits, very frequently pay low prices for butterfat. The organization of a cow testing association in Davidson County and the proposed organization of an association at other places were indications, in Mr. Dean's judgment, of the appreciation of the farmers to dairying. Four hundred silos have been built in the counties of Middle Tennessee during county agents.

Improve seed is being used in order that crop yields may be high and that market prices may be sufficient to justify the cost of production.

Many community meetings and other meetings have been held. Twenty thousand farmers have attended community meetings in Middle Tennessee during the year.

RETURNS FROM 93 COUNTIES IN TENNESSEE GIVE GOV. RYE A MAJORITY 27,594.—SAME COUNTIES GIVE WILSON A MAJORITY OF 42,414 FOR PRESIDENT.

Returns from 93 counties in Tennessee, with all reports practically complete, show that Woodrow Wilson received 137,373 votes to 96,158 votes for Hughes, a majority of 42,414 for the President.

The same 93 counties in Tennessee gave Tom C. Rye for governor 126,226, while his opponent, John Overall, received 98,632, a majority for Gov. Rye of 27,594.

The same 93 counties give K. D. McKellar, democratic nominee for United States senator, 125,814 votes against 95,747 votes for Ben W. Hooper, the republican, a majority for McKellar of 30,067.

Ninety-two counties in Tennessee give Hon. B. A. Enloe, democratic nominee for railroad commissioner, 117,898 votes against 81,474 votes for Terry Abernathy, a majority for Col. Enloe of 36,474. One county made

no report on railroad commissioner.

The counties from which no reports were received or a reliable estimate could be obtained were Johnson, Monroe, and Marion, all in East Tennessee. They will probably add some to the total for the republican, but not materially diminish the great majorities for the democratic nominees in the old Volunteer state last Tuesday.

Four year ago President Wilson received 130,332 votes in Tennessee, while the combined vote of Taft and Roosevelt was 95,169. Eight thousand more good democrats seemingly decided not to stay at home in Tennessee last Tuesday.

The record made by the democratic party last Tuesday shows what a united party can do, and also shows the war is over in Tennessee.
