SOY BEAN DAY Saturday, March 23, 1918

THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK of Dickson, Tennessee, has purchased one-hundred and fifty bushels of Yellow Mammoth Soy Beans which they want to place with the farmers, for seed.

Dr. H. A. Morgan, who is considered one of the best posted men on agricultural questions in Tennessee, informs us that the soil of Dickson County is especially adapted for growing soy beans.

Our plan to encourage the growing of more soy beans, is to place ONE BUSHEL of SEED BEANS with EACH FARMER—so, on

Saturday, March 23rd, at 10 o'clock

At Our Banking House in Dickson,

we will place with the farmers, One Hundred and Fifty Bushels of Soy Beans. Each bushel will be in a separate sack, and a pamphlet giving the best instructions on planting, cultivating and harvesting this crop will be given each farmer.

We will place these beans with the farmer on the basis that he returns us, during the month of November or December of this year, one and one-half bushels of beans for the bushel of seed beans furnished.

Our object, as stated above, in making this offer, is to induce people who have not raised soy beans to try the crop, and to encourage those who have raised them heretofore to raise more.

Be sure and be on hand and get your beans, and DO NOT FORGET the DATE, and remember that we furnish the seed IN SACKS, and you can return the beans this fall, or you can pay us by November 16th, 1918, \$4.90.

Remember the date—Saturday, March 23, 1918, at 10 o'clock. No beans will be reserved for anybody, but those who are here on that day will get their bushel of seed.
