TENNESSEE NEWS.

The business of Neal's State Gazette and job printing establishment will hereafter be conducted under the firm name of Neal & Sidway.

John George has been convicted of murder at Fayetteville and sentenced to be hanged. He was tried on the charge of killing a man named Tower in 1868, at which time he effected his escape and was not arrested until last year.

James C. Woodson has been arrested at Gretna Junction on the charge of robbing the mail of registered letters, by Special Agent James Minnis and Ferrell. He was taken to Memphis and examined before United States Commissioner Garrett, who committed him to jail in default of \$9,000 bail.

Another attempt was made by an incendiary to burn McMinnville, or at least a portion of that town, by placing a bundle of rags saturated with turpentine between the walls of an old frame building, and then applying a match. The fire was discovered and extinguished before it had made much headway.

The Memphis and Raleigh Railroad company has brought suit against the county of Shelby for damages to the amount of \$150,000. The railroad company claims that the county of the county in expelling them from negotiating their bonds in June last was illegal. These bonds were endorsed by the county, and upon motion of the company the injunction was dissolved. The company claims that this action of the county injured the company's financial credit, and depreciated the value of its securities to such an extent as to almost disable it.

GENERAL NEWS.

A London telegram announces the serious illness of Prince Leopold. His seventy-thousand dollars annuity recently granted by parliament has had a bad effect physically.

Algeria papers fear that trouble with the natives is impending. They have heard that 10,000 muskets and 500 cut of powder are imported across the Tunisian frontier weekly.

The County Court of Greene at its July term, levied a school tax of one mill on every dollar's worth of property, twenty-five cents on polls, and twenty-five per cent. on all privilege licenses.

Two well known gentlemen, Duncan Cameron and Dr. Frank Foster, residing near Bennett's Landing, Mississippi, engaged in an altercation which resulted in the former receiving a severe and dangerous cut in the leg and body.

A terrible landslide occurred at Alario, in the province of Bayarre, in Spain. An overhanging rock fell upon and utterly destroyed the village. The disaster was so sudden that few of the inhabitants escaped. Two hundred bodies have already been recovered.

The national board of underwriters of New York have demanded that Chicago shall establish and maintain a fire-patrol of one hundred men, under the command of a fire chief, and that the Chicago board is looking at the proposition, with not much disposition to comply.

The "local option" law of Mississippi is so effective that it is said few if any licenses have been granted in that State since the passage of the act last April. It requires a majority of two over 21, and females over 18, residents in the district giving the petition for license.

Nassau advises to the twentieth century that the Pacific mail company's steamer City of Guatemala, Captain Hildreth, from New York for Aspinwall, was lost on the northeast of Watling island, of the Bahamas, on Thursday the sixteenth instant, at midnight. All hands saved.

A London dispatch says that there is an alarming outbreak of small-pox at New Market, upward of sixty cases having been reported. The authorities have asked the jockey club to permit them to convert their grand stand into a hospital, where the infected persons may be quarantined.

THE GRANGERS.

Roman Catholics in Wisconsin are leaving the granges, the Bishop of Milwaukee has issued a pastoral against them.

Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, of Virginia, favors the apparent objects of the Grangers, but objects to their secrecy and to the introduction of women into its membership.

The Kansas Farmer objects to the grange taking so much money out of the State, and shows that if the disbursement fee were \$8 instead of \$10 the sum of \$14,000 would have been returned in Kansas.

Toward the close of the last session Congress received a petition from the colored citizens of Georgia asking for an organized militia arm corps, coupled with a complaint that there is a secret society known as the "Patrons of Husbandry," which they fear intends to bear oppressively on them.

The South is rivaling the North and West in the number and strength of her granges, wherever located, are brethren. They don't ask each other whether a decade ago they were the grey or the blue. They only want to know that they are American citizens, and are working for the same laudable objects.

The grange movement has been more successful in California than elsewhere. Not content with the success already achieved, the Patrons are starting a bank of their own, with a capital of \$5,000,000 in 50,000 \$100 shares. The Patrons have been enabled to charter fifty vessels themselves this year, and are confident that their facilities will be ample in future to take all their grain to market.

United Grangers, Ann Arbor, Mich., thinking that a wage of \$29 a month was too high for hired men, sent an agent to New York to capture forty newly-arrived Germans and send them for a season. After two weeks' work he secured his men and paid their fares West. Arriving at Chelsea, Mich., all but eight refused to disembark, and went further west, while six of the eight hired themselves to countrymen of theirs who were not Patrons. The grange is out about \$1,000 by the attempt to import cheap German labor.
