OBION COUNTY QUARTERLY COURT.

ORDERS.

D. S. Woods, constable in No. 14, resigned and J. H. Nichols elected to fill unexpired term.

Mrs. Elizabeth Nelson, pauper, allowed \$5.00 to pay for conveyance to friends.

Sixty dollars was allowed John Dyer and Ada Dyer for one year's maintenance, payable quarterly. C. M. Montgomery named as trustee.

J. P. Nichols is permitted to peddle without a license.

Notaries public appointed: Chas. W. Miles, Jr., Miss Blanche Roberts, Thos. J. Bonner, C. O. Ramer, S. M. Fields, Hunter Elam, C. V. Jones.

W. J. Lowe ordered to build levee from Walnut Grove school to I. C. R. R., cost not to exceed \$100.

H. H. Sellars appointed commissioner to look after McConnell-Fulton levee.

Leonard Slaydon, col., is released from paying poll tax and road work.

Morilla Wells, Jim Wicker and R. J. Long were allowed \$40.00 each for maintenance, same to be paid in quarterly installments.

County Judge authorized to appoint a committee to ascertain amount of repairs necessary on Clark Lane levee, and to add land to said levee.

S. R. Bratton, J. C. Isbell and R. Polk appointed a committee to investigate as to the advisability of providing better quarters for County Judge's office and report to the January term.

O. H. Clemmons, J. H. Pryor and J. F. Holloway appointed to have steel bridge built over Davidson Creek, near Polk, between Nos. 4 and 6.

J. P. Cloar authorized to build bridge in No. 10, near L. Maupin's home, not to cost over \$75.00.

Ordered that Mrs. Emily Alexander be paid \$60 per year, quarterly, to the trustee, Frank Lawson.

Ordered that Albert Hunt, col., be paid \$30 per year to P. H. Carroll, trustee.

Zalpa Riddle was allowed \$60 per year for maintenance.

John Phillips was released from road work and taxes for 1915.

Ora Farley was allowed \$60 for maintenance, paid to J. F. Holloway, trustee, quarterly.

Ordered that the funds of the Holloway School be divided between the Polk, Rives and Harper's Valley schools.

Ordered that the Trustee be credited with delinquent taxes, double assessments, errors, etc., a list of which was filed, amounting to \$6,346.10.

County Court Clerk ordered and empowered to borrow from different county banks the sum of \$12,000, the amount of the deficit now in sight, at six per cent interest, the same to be due and payable on the first day of March, 1916.
