TO THE CITIZENS OF UNION CITY:—

Permit me to take this opportunity of addressing you relative to my candidacy for Alderman in the election to be held January 7th, 1922. On account of the shortness of the time before election it will be impossible for me to see every voter in person, hence I am taking this method of reaching everyone.
