From the Army of Tennessee. EXTENDED LINE, SEVEN MILES WEST OF MARIETTA, JUNE 16, 1864.

At noon yesterday heavy bodies of the enemy were observed massing in front of Jackson's and Gist's brigades of Walker's division.

Gen. E. K. Smith, in a private letter, written on the 7th ult., to a citizen of Lynchburg, says: "We have just had one of the most successful and brilliant campaigns of the war, lasting only 30 days."

The rain poured down last night in torrents and without cessation—a perfect deluge.

We learn from our Atlanta correspondent at Marietta, that Brig. Gen. Louis J. Park, of Arkansas, was shot in the calf of the leg, in the fight of Friday evening.

Letter from Marietta.

MARIETTA, JUNE 17, 1864. My attention was directed on yesterday to the first and sympathetic emotion exhibited by the young ladies, in what was one of the wild walks of this beautiful town.

I am sorry to communicate that Capt. C. H. George of the Griffin Sharpshooters, was wounded yesterday through the left lung.

A sharp skirmish took place on our extreme left today. No fighting to-day on our centre.

The enemy shelled Kennesaw Mountain, this evening about five o'clock.
