PUBLIC ACTS.

First Congress of the Confederate States.

Passed at the fourth session, which was begun and held at the city of Richmond, in the State of Virginia, on Monday, the seventh day of December, A. D. 1862, and ended on Thursday, the eighteenth day of February, 1864.

CHAP. CXLV.—An Act to provide an Invalid Corps.

The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact, That all officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians, privates and seamen, who have been disabled by wounds, or other causes, and who are entitled to the service of the Confederate States, and in the line of duty, shall be retired or discharged from their respective positions as hereinafter provided.

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
