**LOOKING FOR TAFT**

MAN WITH REVOLVER ALMOST SUCCEEDED IN GETTING INTO PRESIDENT TAFT'S PRIVATE OFFICE TODAY.

Washington, D. C., June 16.—Armed with a 38-caliber revolver, James Stricklin, a miner who gives his home as Cumberland, Md., gained entrance to the executive offices at the White House today and almost succeeded in passing the doorkeeper guarding the president's private office. The man was well dressed and walked briskly into the executive office and said he had an appointment with the president. He succeeded in avoiding suspicion until at the very threshold of the president's office. Here the doorkeeper noticed a slight expression of excitement about the man's eyes and just as Stricklin was entering the door the doorkeeper changed his mind and detained him. He called for detectives and Sergeant Dalrymple questioned the man and decided that he was not right mentally. He was searched and a revolver and one hundred dollars in cash were found on his person. Stricklin says he is sixty-four years of age and insists that Taft has been advertising in all of the papers for him. He went to the White House, he said, in answer to these ads. An investigation has been started to ascertain if he is not the same man who attempted to reach Roosevelt two years ago under similar circumstances.

**DRAWING A DISTINCTION**

ATTORNEY FORREST FOR LEE BROWNE SAYS PAYMENT FOR A VOTE IS NOT NECESSARILY A BRIBE.

Chicago, June 16.—Denying that the acceptance of a reward for the performance of an act such as casting a vote is bribery except where there has been a previous corrupt understanding, Attorney Forrest made an argument today against the admission of the testimony of Representatives Link and Beckmeyer in the trial of Lee O'Neil Browne. Both of these representatives the state announced would testify to having been paid for their votes for Lorimer. If the objection urged by Forrest is sustained by the court it means that Representative White's story must stand alone as the sole reliance of the state.

**THOUSANDS DROWNED**

Towns of Hassan and Kolch in Asia Minor Destroyed By Flood, According to Dispatch.

Constantinople, June 16.—The towns of Hassan and Kolch in Asia Minor have been destroyed by floods, and according to dispatches received thousands of people have lost their lives. The reports are lacking in detail.

**THE GOULDS ARE COMING**

TO PALESTINE TOMORROW, ACCOMPANIED BY RECEIVER FREEMAN OF I. & G. N.—MISSION IS NOT KNOWN AT THIS TIME.

George Gould and son, Kingston, large stockholders in the I. & G. N. railroad, accompanied by Receiver Freeman and a party of prominent railroad officials, will arrive in this city tomorrow, coming by special train, and it is reported they will spend the day and possibly longer here. It is not known what the mission of the visitors is, but it is supposed to have to do with the sale and reorganization of the road.

**MANY FLOOD VICTIMS**

Dispatches From King Peter of Serbia Say Between Four and Five Hundred Drown.

Belgrade, Serbia, June 16.—Dispatches received today from King Peter, who is personally conducting the relief work in the flood district in the Moravia river district, indicate that between four and five hundred lives have been lost. At least twenty towns are practically destroyed and thousands of the inhabitants are marooned by the flood waters. Unless the relief work is expedited many of these will either be drowned or will die of starvation.

**OKLAHOMA CAPITAL MUDDLE.**

Court Holds That Governor Haskell is Amenable to State Courts.

Oklahoma City, June 16.—Holding that the enabling act legally imposes the condition that the state capital remain at Guthrie until 1912 and that the attorney of Logan county has a right to apply for an injunction to prevent the removal, Judge Huston today overruled Governor Haskell's demurrer. The judge also held that the governor and all state officials are amenable to the state courts. Attorney General West will immediately ask the supreme court for a writ to prevent the enforcement of the injunction.

**WORK IS HELD UP**

ON BIG SAN FRANCISCO ARENA, BUT PROMOTERS OF THE FIGHT WILL NOT GIVE UP PLANS WITHOUT LEGAL FIGHT.

San Francisco, Cal., June 16.—Promoters Rickard and Gleason of the Jeffries and Johnson fight announced this morning that they will not remove the fight from San Francisco without first taking the matter to the courts, to ascertain the strength of Governor Gillette's order to District Attorney Webb to stop the fight in San Francisco. Webb will in all probability ask for an injunction tomorrow, and if it is granted the fight will likely be transferred to Reno.

In the meantime work on the big arena was ordered stopped today.

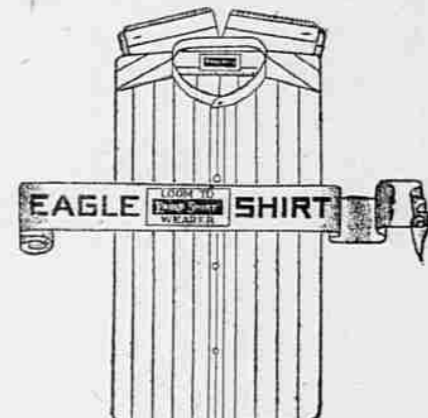
