## THE CITY BEING WIPED OUT

### Fires Rage Throughout the City Again Today, and Add New Horrors Every Hour.

Oakland, Cal., April 19, 6 a. m.—The fire in San Francisco has spread to the residence district. It is raging unchecked this morning. The entire city seems doomed to destruction.

The people have nothing to eat except such as can be obtained in the outlying districts.

Not a single wire remains out of San Francisco direct to the continent.

The United States Mint is now ablaze.

## MECHANICS' PAVILION COLLAPSED TODAY

### AND MANY INJURED BURNED TO DEATH.—THE NURSES FLED TO SAVE THEIR LIVES.

Oakland, Cal., April 19.—Many of the injured at Mechanics' Pavilion which had been made into a temporary morgue, were burned to death by the collapse of the pavilion. More than one hundred were burned to death. The nurses were forced to flee from the injured and save their own lives.

### ENTIRE BUSINESS SECTION

and Half of Residence Section Was Burned at Eleven This Morning.

New York, April 19.—At 11 a. m. the Postal Telegraph Company received the following dispatch from San Francisco, by way of Oakland:

"Fires are still raging, and the entire city is doomed. No water is to be had except along the bay and dynamite is still being used to check the flames, but without result. The powder supply is exhausted; even that in the government arsenal is all gone. The fire cannot be checked and must burn itself out. Every building in the business section and half of the residence section is destroyed. Not a large building is left in the city."

### STANFORD UNIVERSITY

San Jose Has Been Destroyed.

Oakland, April 19.—Fire at 8 a. m. swept over Knob Hill, the very center of the finest residence section. The fire is still beyond all control. In Santa Rosa not a single building escaped destruction or damage. The loss of life there is now estimated at five hundred.

All but two of the Stanford University buildings are reported gone.

Every business block in San Jose is destroyed. Martial law has been declared there.

Santa Cruz, Monterey and Hollister suffered heavily.

### MINT NOT DESTROYED

When Supt. Leach Wired Washington Last Night.

Washington, D. C., April 19.—Superintendent Leach of the government mint at San Francisco in a telegram sent last night at 9 o'clock, says the building with three hundred and nine million dollars is saved. His report says the mint is the only building in blocks around left standing. Building was slightly damaged by the earthquake. The treasury officials here are not convinced that the mint has not been destroyed since the last report.

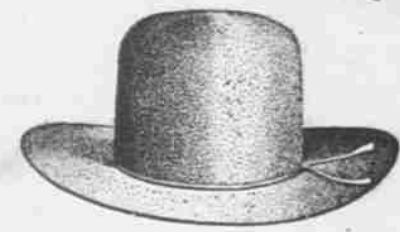

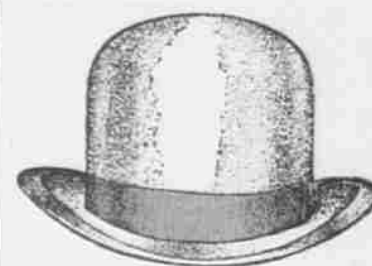
