THE GOVERNMENT TRAINS

Are Hurrying To the Doomed City With Food and Supplies For Destitute People.

Washington, D. C., April 20.—Special trains carrying express cars chartered by the government to speed supplies to San Francisco left Washington this morning, taking aboard such stores as have been collected here. It is generally believed that the chief of staff has arranged for an unobstructed right-of-way, and the specials will probably make record runs. The trains are loaded chiefly with tents and commissary supplies.

At Chicago the trains will take the Northwestern route, then the Union Pacific, Southern Pacific, and efforts will be made to cover the distance in three days.

PEOPLE ARE STARVING.

Three Hundred Thousand are Without Food, Water and Shelter.

San Francisco, April 20.—Three hundred thousand people are literally starving and famishing in the streets and on the hills near this city today. No water is to be had except that which the soldiers are distributing. Fabulous prices are being charged for food. Soda crackers are selling at ten cents each, and bread at one dollar and fifty cents a loaf. Canned goods are practically all gone.

SUB-TREASURY DESTROYED.

CEMETERIES IN PATH

Of the Fire Which is Leaving Nothing in the Doomed City.

San Francisco, April 20, 6 a. m.—The fire which skipped some houses at the base of Telegraph Hill came back and consumed them. The last houses on top of the hill are burning. The flames on Van Ness avenue are proceeding toward the water front and will doubtless make a clean sweep. On Octavia street the fire is heading toward Laurel, Cavalry, Odd Fellows and Masonic cemeteries.

The latest information is that the big Federal warehouse the cannery near by, overlooking Fort Mason, and near the harbor entrance, and within a half mile of Presidio Reservation, are now in the direct path of the flames.

Military headquarters were forced here by the flames into Presidio Reservation.

RELIEF TRAINS

From Every Quarter are Being Sent to San Francisco in a Hurry.

San Francisco, Cal., April 20.—The Oakland ferry house is crowded with about three thousand men, women and children of all nationalities and all conditions of life. Many are scantily clothed and carrying articles they tried to save.

A train load of provisions was received at Oakland last night from Los Angeles, and this morning the ferry house crowd had the first meal for twenty-four hours. This morning a hospital train also arrived from Los Angeles. General Funston has dispatched officers to Los Angeles to purchase two hundred thousand rations, consisting of bread, meat, vegetables and condiments.

Three hundred thousand rations from Seattle are expected early in the week.
