IS BEING WATCHED

RECOGNIZED LEADER OF ANTI-DIAZ MOVEMENT IS SHADOWED BY SIXTY SECRET SERVICE MEN AT SAN ANTONIO.

(Herald Special.)
San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 17.—Francisco Madero, the recognized leader of the anti-Diaz party in Mexico, and now a resident of San Antonio, is being watched here by sixty secret service men, according to police authorities. To the vigilance of these detectives is credited largely the discovery of Madero's alleged plot to overthrow the Mexican republic. The spies are Mexicans and are said to have the co-operation of the United States federal officers. Madero's plans in twelve states were frustrated and a serious revolution averted.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 17.—The announcement of socialists that they would not oppose the re-election of Samuel Gompers as president of the American Federation of Labor is believed to result from the attitude of T. L. Lewis, the free lance who controls 2360 votes from the Mine Workers.

"The socialists have no right to expect my support," said Lewis today. "If there is to be a successor to Gompers he must be quite right before he wins my vote."

SOCIALISTS BACK DOWN

ANNOUNCE THEY WILL NOT OPPOSE RE-ELECTION OF GOMPERS AS PRESIDENT OF FEDERATION OF LABOR.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 17.—A big fight is on over the proposed amalgamation of the United Brotherhood and the Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners of America. The former organization, with a membership of 200,000, charges the latter with strike-breaking.

AMERICAN WANTS AID

I. L. HEFLSTEIN, A RESIDENT OF MUSKOGEE, HELD IN MEXICAN PRISON, WRITES FRIENDS IN MORSE CODE.

Muskogee, Okla., Nov. 17.—A letter written in the Morse code from an isolated town in Mexico by Irvy Lee Heflstein, a Muskogee man, asks for aid. The code letter is badly written, but indicates he is being held in a Mexican prison. The local Odd Fellows' lodge, of which he is a member, will make an investigation.

TOLSTOI IS STILL ALIVE

AT ST. PETERSBURG THE REPORT OF HIS DEATH RESULTED IN THE DOORS OF ALL THE ATRES BEING CLOSED.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.—Authoritative dispatches received here today declare Count Tolstoi is still alive. He passed a restless night, and his temperature today is 104. When reports of his death reached here the theatres were closed, and all social entertainments were cancelled. Many messages of condolence were sent the countess.

London, Nov. 17.—All London morning papers today printed dispatches of Tolstoi's death. A general expression of joy was heard everywhere when later messages stated he was still alive.
