

INTERNATIONAL COURT

For the Settlement of Disputes is the Aim of Conference Which Met in Washington Today.

(Herald Special.)

Washington, D. C., Dec. 15.—To promote the cause of an international court of justice, the American Society for the Judicial Settlement of International Disputes met at the New Willard Hotel today and began what promises to be a highly notable conference. The prominence of the speakers alone is sufficient to attract wide public attention to the deliberations of the conference, the sessions of which will last three days.

President Taft, who is honorary president of the society, heads the list of speakers, which also includes Secretary of State Knox, Senator Ellhu Root, Dr. Charles W. Eliot of Harvard, Judge Simeon E. Baldwin of Connecticut, Joseph H. Choate, Representative Richard Bartholdt of Missouri, Thomas Nelson Page, the noted author, William Dudley Foulke of Indiana, and Jonkheer J. Loudon, the Netherlands minister.

The purpose of the American Society for the Judicial Settlement of International Disputes is distinctly different from the specific aims of other peace societies. It does not confine its efforts to a propaganda for world peace or for general disarmament. Its mission is to provide the machinery by which these two desirable objects may become possible. Therefore it is working for the establishment of an international court of arbitral justice, as recommended by the second Hague conference, and the creation of a world-wide sentiment that will compel governments to appeal in all matters to this proposed court, instead of resorting to warfare.

One Thousand Farmers of Canada In Convention at Ottawa to Discuss Legislation.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 15.—Nearly one thousand representative farmers of Canada, representing both the western and eastern provinces, met in convention in the Grand Opera House in this city today to adopt a program in regard to tariff legislation, reciprocity, trade preference, government ownership and other important public questions in which they are interested. Tomorrow the delegates will present their program at a conference with the dominion government officials in the assembly chamber of the House of Commons.

NEW CAROLINA LINE OPEN

Delegates From Many Cities and Towns Journeyed to Winston-Salem Today.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Dec. 15.—Governor Kitchin delivered the principal address at the exercises today in celebration of the opening of the Winston-Salem South-Bound Railroad. Delegates from many cities and towns took part in the demonstration. The new road runs from Winston-Salem to Wadesboro, ninety-three miles, and will be operated jointly by the Atlantic Coast Line and the Norfolk and Western, by which company it is owned. The new road forms a connecting link between the two larger systems and practically creates a new trunk line from Cincinnati to Charleston.

ELEVATORS AN ISSUE

Private and Government Ownership of Grain Elevators Advocated in Saskatchewan.

Regina, Sask., Dec. 15.—The Saskatchewan legislature convened today for its annual session, though no business is to be transacted until after the holidays, to which time an adjournment will be taken immediately after organization. Of the business to come before the session the most important is the proposed legislation dealing with the ownership and operation of grain elevators of the province. Both private and government ownership have been advocated, but the plan most likely of adoption is that recommended by the Elevator Commission, which provides a scheme for a co-operative company, controlled by the grain growers and aided by the government.

DINNER TO NEW GOVERNORS.
