REBELS RETAKE CITY OF HANKOW

(Continued from Page 1.) who sought protection from each other. Violence May Follow. Prince Ching, the premier, is using his influence to restrain that element of the Manchus who may be disposed toward violence. For their part, the Manchus dread a rebel investment of the capital. Certain legations are advising both Chinese and Manchus to take refuge in case of trouble behind the Methodist mission, which is situated in that corner of the main city lying between the legation quarters and the east wall. This is the most easily defended section of the city and the legation guards may be able to protect those who gather there. Exodus Continues. Long lines of carts piled high with the household belongings of fleeing citizens continue to pass out of the city gates before the early closing hours. Soldiers now guard all the city gates. Many carts emerge from the Forbidden City, some guarded by soldiers. Carloads of silver, sometimes without a guard, pass day and night in and out of the legation quarters. The money is brought to the legations and a temporary safe deposit and then removed to replace the paper currencies or to be forwarded to the minister of war, generally in exchange for royal troops, who are receiving their pay with unprecedented regularity. Wealthy citizens also are entrusting their fortunes to foreigners. Preparing for Wounded. The government has asked the mission doctors to establish a Red Cross hospital outside the city for the reception of the wounded who are expected to return in a few days from the encounter with Gen. Li Yuan Heng's rebels. Foreigners are anxious over the situation in Peking, but not alarmed. Outlets have not yet entered the legation quarters. Nevertheless the strictest precautions are being taken. Learned physicians form a line about the legation walls and extending into the Chinese quarters. Fears are entertained for the foreigners in the province of Shan Si, many of whom are American. The rebels in that province are said to be in possession of the capital, Tai Yuan Fu, where there are several missions.

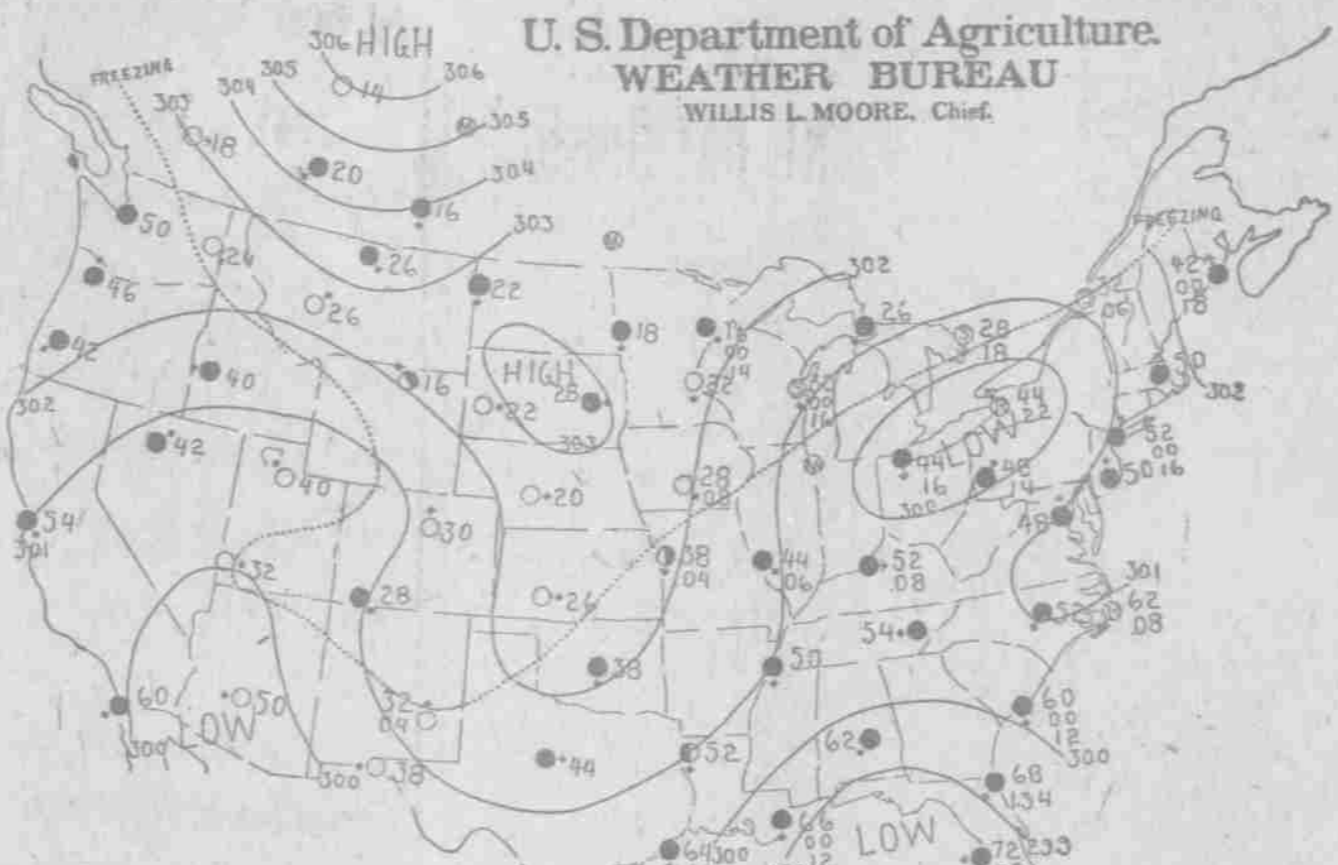

El Paso, Tuesday, Oct. 31, 1911. Forecasts. El Paso and vicinity: Fair tonight and Wednesday. New Mexico: Tonight generally fair; Wednesday, increasing cloudiness. West Texas: Fair tonight and Wednesday; colder tonight in southeast portion. Weather Notes. The pressure is relatively low from the Gulf of Mexico northward to the lower lakes; it is decidedly high over Alberta. The principal precipitation area of the last 24 hours includes Iowa, Missouri, the Ohio valley and the eastern half of the lake region. There is every indication that the native cities of Shanghai, Nanking, Chung King, Chan Chow and the lower Yang Tze forces will be in the hands of the revolutionists within a week. Whether their conquest will be accompanied with a wholesale massacre of Manchus, depends on the influence of the leaders. Foreigners at no point have been molested and they will remain unharmed, the rebel chiefs assure the press, unless such actions as those of the imperialists at Hankow continue, and the reports of the dishonor and murder of defenseless children and women make it impossible to control the rabble. Further reports of upriver towns and others in the heart of the Sea Chou province going over to the rebels are received. The panic among the officials at Peking is regarded as one of the worst features of the situation, as it betrays a weakness on the part of the dynasty before the spirit of revolution. Edicts Considered Surrender. Leaders of the new party look on the issuance of the edicts as a victory far greater than anything that has been won on the field of battle. Eye witnesses of fighting at Hankow pay tribute to the imperialist forces. They say that the revolutionists were little more than an untrained mob, but courageous and quite ready to continue the fighting. The rebels are operating the Hu Nan mint and making great quantities of dollar coins is being redeemed immediately on presentation. Well informed persons believe that if the next few days pass without an outbreak there will be a strong possibility of the situation being saved through the appointment of Yuan Shi Kai as premier, with a younger Manchus as a figurehead in order to comply with the protocol of 1910: the forming of a cabinet composed entirely of Chinese, the immediate convocation of parliament and the abandonment of the railroad nationalization plan.
