

UNCLE SAM, PATRIARCH

AND WHAT HE IS DOING FOR HIS AMERICAN CHILDREN—A NEW SERIES OF LETTERS BY FRANK G. CARPENTER.

All About Some Striking Movements in the National Government and the Changes They Will Make in the Country and People—Reclaiming the Deserts and Draining Swamps—Doubling Corn-fields, Cotton Plantations and Orchards, and Many Other Things.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—This is the first of a series of letters which I shall write from Sunday to Sunday upon Uncle Sam, patriarch. A dozen years ago our great national relative was merely the business manager for the American people.

Uncle Sam, Patriarch. That was the condition until a decade or so ago, when Uncle Sam had an awakening. He then began to assume the position of a father to his American children, and he has now become a great creative force working for the betterment and protection of all the people.

These new movements are along a hundred different lines, and they embrace every part of our country from ocean to ocean and from the great lakes to the gulf. They affect every branch of business, every grade of society, and every man, woman and child.

The Deserts and the Swamps. Take for instance the great mangrove tract of making golden springs up on the soil of our waste lands. You have read something of it in the opening of the Roosevelt dam.

Uncle Sam's Plans for the Miner. Many of the latest schemes relate to the mines and the miners, Uncle Sam has plans for saving our minerals. We have the greatest coal lands upon earth and there are billions of tons left upon government property.

Harvesting the Waters. This is another big scheme, bills in the aid of which are now before congress. The government scientists are testing the matter, and they have collected a vast deal of new information.

Government Schemes for the Sailor. The government is also doing a great deal for the sailors. It has a life-saving service with 450 stations. It guards our coasts by 1200 lighthouses and it has 48 lightships and 2800 buoys.

Uncle Sam, Exporter. What our patriarchal relative is doing to make our crops all more abundant abroad is worth noting. In the past two or three years he has organized a new system for the development of our foreign commerce and he now has his national trade dressers and government agents in almost every country.

Our Big Lumber Trade. It is a life question as to what Uncle Sam will do with the forests of the union, and whether they should not be given over to the people. He has still about 500,000,000 board feet of standing timber, and in many of the national forests he is cutting the trees and saving them into lumber.

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"WORLD IN BOSTON" UNIQUE EXPOSITION

Will Illustrate Growth of Mission Work in the Pagan Lands.

Boston, Mass., April 21.—With the foremost American religious and mission workers here preparing for participation in "The World in Boston," the most elaborate exhibit of the works of home and foreign missionaries ever attempted in this country or abroad, everything is in readiness for the opening of the exposition tomorrow in Mechanics' hall, the largest in New England.

Some 20,000 persons who will take part in the exposition itself, which will be in progress until May 29, thronged about the points of interest of Boston today. Many of the visiting Christian workers inspected the revolutionary landmarks, but the exposition hall itself was by no means a place of inactivity.

Samuel R. Capen, LL.D., president of the American board of commissioners for foreign mission and president also of "The World in Boston," will preside. Bishop Lawrence of the Episcopal diocese of eastern Massachusetts will deliver the opening address, and Mrs. Helen Barrett Montgomery, of Rochester, N. Y., and Booker T. Washington will speak.

Marka Progress of Missions. "The World in Boston," embraces the reproduction, on a large scale, of conditions which have marked the inauguration and progress of all missionary work. Exhibits show what is actually taking place in the "home field" by the reproduction of scenes illustrating contact with the Indians and the people of the western states.

To bring the enterprise to perfection has been the task of many months. Besides the projectors, there is literally an army of volunteer helpers, or "stewards," who have been studying and undergoing training to take part in the exposition as impersonators, demonstrators, or lecturers.
