The Kindergarten Method of Teaching Is Criticized by Dr. Parlin.

DELEGATES LEAVE FRISCO FOR HOMES

San Francisco, Cal., July 14.—Delegates to the annual convention of the National Education association today held their last regular meeting and tomorrow they will all be on their way to their homes or summer resorts, where they will spend the remainder of their vacations.

At the departmental meetings today, there were several addresses of interest. Some of the most interesting were "Growing Children," by Cyril A. Stebbins, instructor in agricultural education at the University of California; "Art as a Cultivator of the Imagination," by May Gerhart, supervisor of drawing in the schools of Los Angeles, Cal.; "How to prevent Backwardness and Mental Deficiency in Children," by Henry H. Goddard, director of the New Jersey School for the Feeble-Minded; "What Constitutes a Subnormal Child," by Vinnie C. Heeks, special psychologist of Oakland, Cal. schools, and "The Kindergarten of the Future," by Dr. Frank E. Parlin, superintendent of schools of Cambridge, Mass.

KINDERGARTEN SYSTEM WRONG

"Although I am a friend of the kindergarten," said Dr. Parlin, "I believe the orthodox type is neither sacred nor perfect, that the position of the conservative kindergartners is unwise and untenable, that they emphasize the most defective parts of Froebel's system and neglect his most valuable principles."

CHARGE THREE WITH PLANNING REVOLT

Cananea, Sonora, Mex., July 14.—Reports here say that R. R. Arnold, Rafael Flores and a son of General Lorenzo Torres have been arrested and placed in jail at Hermosillo charged with conspiring to start a counter-revolution with the veteran rurales of the Diaz army as the nucleus of their armed forces. Arnold is a brother of a former mayor of Cananea, who was deposed by Juan Cabral and Flores was commandant of rurales prior to occupation of Cananea by the insurgents.

BARRACKS MAY BE A MENACE TO AMERICA

San Diego, Cal., July 14.—Col. Conzales has begun the work on the barracks for 800 men at Tia Juana, Mexico. The barracks are to be well fortified and the guns will be placed in such a position that they can be trained on American territory. This is said to be the first active work on the part of the Diaz administration toward fortifying every town of importance on the Mexican peninsula.

NACO ENTERS PROTEST

Naco, Sonora, Mex., July 14.—Considerable excitement was occasioned in Naco when four gendarmes, or fiscal guards, appeared with orders from Kosterlitzky, at Magdalena, to resume their station here. A mass meeting and street demonstration was held, resulting in a protest being forwarded to president de la Barra against Kosterlitzky's action in attempting to station his men in this town.

AMENDMENT TO CHARTER IS REPELLED BY BANK

Austin, Tex., July 14.—The Rio Grande Valley Bank and Trust company, of El Paso, has repelled an amendment to its charter increasing its capital from \$100,000 to \$300,000.

GATES'S CONDITION CONSIDERED GRAVE

Paris, France, July 14.—Throughout the day there was a procession of inquirers at the hotel where John W. Gates lies critically ill. One hundred and fifty cable messages from American friends had been received. Mr. Gates passed a fairly good night, but his condition is considered grave. The heart for the first time showed signs of weakness this morning, but recovered quickly. A slight improvement in the condition of Mr. Gates was observed this afternoon. The day has been the hottest of the summer, but the high temperature was said to have been rather helpful in the treatment the physicians are giving.

New York, N. Y., July 14.—Six feet tall, powerful, handsome, high-browed, cultured, courteous, well-dressed, officer in the Norwegian army, graduate of Heidelberg, son of a wealthy banker, accused burglar—such is Karl Von Metz Meyer, of fashionable Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, N. Y. Never before in the "city of churches," has such a personality been carried by the police, who declare he has confessed. Meyer, they say, performed his "jobs" while wearing a dress suit and false moustache, a gold-headed cane twirling in his be-diamonded fingers. He would march up the steps of fancy boarding houses at dinner time, according to the Brooklyn police, and would depart with the movable contents of all the rooms concealed within the dome of his silk hat.
