ALDRICH DENIES HINES'S STATEMENT

Declares He Never Said He and Taft Wanted Lorimer Elected.

Washington, D. C., July 26.—Former United States senator Nelson W. Aldrich of Rhode Island, flatly contradicted at today's Lorimer investigation the story given by Edward Hines, of Chicago, that Aldrich had intimated to governor Deneen that president Taft was of the belief that Lorimer could be elected and was the most available man.

Instead of telling Hines that he and the president were anxious to have Lorimer elected, Mr. Aldrich declared that he said Lorimer's candidacy was "not objectionable."

When attorneys for Lorimer, on cross examination, tried to show that the former senator might have said "acceptable," Mr. Aldrich said that he said "not objectionable" and that he meant that word and nothing more. He added that he knew Hines would use the information given him at Springfield.

Mr. Aldrich also denied that he told Hines that he considered Lorimer the only man who could be elected. He said he did not ask senator Penrose to bring Hines to consult with him in regard to the Illinois election, and added that he did not believe senator Penrose brought Hines to his room.

The regular procedure of the committee was interrupted to allow Mr. Aldrich to take the stand. He shook hands with members of the committee, taking particular pains to greet senator Lorimer, who listened to his testimony.

EL PASO WILL GET LOWEST KEY RATE

Will Secure a Lower Rate Than Any Other City in Texas.

El Paso will soon enjoy a key rate for fire insurance of 20 cents. A reduction from 44 cents, the present key rate, to 26 cents is to be made at once. This credit will be allowed for the increased water service which has been installed. This includes the new mains, hydrants and connections. The new hook and ladder wagon which has been ordered, will reduce the rate two cents lower and the elimination of the pipe on San Francisco street which is below standard will lower the rate to 20 cents.

A reduction of ten cents will also result from the installation of a duplex system of pumps, mayor Kelly says, and the rate will then be about 20 cents. This will reduce El Paso's key rate to the lowest in the state. Beaumont has a rate of 25 cents, the lowest at the present time, but El Paso is expected to have a rate two cents lower than this within 90 days, mayor Kelly says.

ST. LOUIS BANKERS TO COME IN NOVEMBER

The first week in November has been decided upon as the date for entertaining the St. Louis bankers and prominent business men who will be brought here as the guests of the chamber of commerce in order that they may understand El Paso's natural resources.

The committee in charge of the arrangements for this visit has decided upon that time as better than August, as conditions here and in Mexico will have assumed the normal, and it will be possible for many of the St. Louis bankers to visit this city as a part of their trip to New Orleans to attend the bankers' convention. J. G. McNary will spend several days in St. Louis next week interesting the bankers there in the El Paso trip.

AGUA PRIETA IS PEACEFUL AGAIN

Agua Prieta, Sonora, Mexico, July 26.—Lieut. Col. Rafael Romero, superintending the discharge of insurrecto soldiers, who was thrown into prison when he demanded the surrender of the soldiers' guns, was released late yesterday when he promised that the pay of the men would be increased to from \$400 to \$500 each. The men were at first promised only \$40 each Mexican money.

The situation is less tense and it is believed that trouble of a serious nature has been averted.
