

## LEFT WILL GET RECOGNITION EASIER

To Be Presented to Him Saturday Before Departure For Beverly.

### SENATOR PENROSE MAKES THE PROMISE

Washington, D. C., July 21.—Chairman Penrose of the senate finance committee, today promised president Taft to lay the Canadian reciprocity bill, with the approval of both the senate and the house, on the president's table by tomorrow afternoon, more than three hours before the president plans to leave Washington for a week end stay at Beverly. Senator Penrose said that it might get through tomorrow morning and then would be brought immediately to the white house.

**LaFollette Assails Press.**  
Assailing the press of the United States for its support of the Canadian reciprocity bill, Senator LaFollette, of Wisconsin, made his closing speech against the bill in the senate today. He expressed the belief that newspapers would suffer loss of influence, for the support they have given to legislation in which he said, "they have a direct money interest."

**Says Press Has Failed.**  
"The press has failed in its duty to the public in regard to this legislation," he said.

**Mr. LaFollette referred to testimony given before the finance committee of the senate, that a newspaper organization had sent out a communication to many papers, urging them to favorably treat the reciprocity agreement.** He deplored this attitude of the newspapers.

**"We have senators on this floor who are bankers," said senator LaFollette, "senators who are woolen manufacturers, senators who are interested in lumber and mines. Let no newspaper hereafter assail any senator because he supports legislation in his own peculiar interest."**

**Hitchcock Newspaper Owner.**  
Senator LaFollette referred to senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, who had interrupted him, as "a newspaper owner," who had a direct interest at stake. "Is it not just as fair for me to criticize the senator from Wisconsin," retorted Hitchcock, "for advocating a duty on paper as the interest of great paper mills of Wisconsin, to which the whole country pays tribute?"

**Does Not Favor Duty.**  
Senator LaFollette said that he did not favor a duty paper; that he was in favor of free print paper and would propose a measure in that interest as a direct tariff measure. He objected to the reciprocity bill, he said, because the newspaper industry, in his opinion, at the expense of the farmers, whose duties on their products would be removed.

## CAMORRISTS END TRIAL BY FIGHT

Excitement Runs Rife in the Italian Court and an Adjournment Is Forced.

### PRISONERS INJURED IN THE BIG WRANGLE

Viterbo, Italy, July 21.—The most violent scene of the Camorrist trial to date, was provoked today by a personal dispute between Capt. Fabroni, one of the chief instruments in ferretting the crimes of the Camorra and lawyer Lloy. In the tumult all the other lawyers fled from the room.

Enrico Alfano, charged with being the real head of the Camorra, and Genaro Abbatemaggio, the informer, were thrown out bodily by the carabinieri. Giocanni Bartolozzi fell in a fit and president Bianchi, helpless to maintain order, declared the session adjourned.

**Fabroni Is Calm.**  
Throughout the hubbub Fabroni stood pale but impassive. As the courtroom was being cleared, he said: "The Camorra, in or out of court, cannot intimidate me."

Fabroni, captain of the Neapolitan carabinieri, was assigned by the ministry of justice to uproot the Camorras. During the last few days he has told on the stand the result of his detective work, and operations of his associates.

Alexandro Lloy, now attorney for the defence, formerly edited a newspaper. Fabroni has testified that revelations against the Camorra made by editor Lloy were not in harmony with the claims set up by lawyer Lloy in defence of his clients. Bitter personal feeling between the detective and lawyer resulted.

**Some Choice Language.**  
When court opened today Captain Fabroni was asked by Calvario Santoro, the crown prosecutor, whether the assertion of Zanelli that marabai Capasutti had tried to influence him to swear falsely against his fellow prisoners, was true.

**Removed From Courtroom.**  
Finally the president ordered Abbatemaggio and Alfano removed from the room. They were not disposed to go quietly, and were seized by carabinieri and dragged from the place.

## WASHOUTS ON ALL LINES TO WEST

Trains Are Marooned to the West of El Paso Friday Morning.

### HEAVY RAINFALL IN EARLY MORNING

Trains coming into El Paso from the west were marooned by heavy rains Friday morning. The storm which broke about 3 o'clock, washed out the S. P. tracks and washed down telegraph lines so that orders could not be sent to or received from the trains. Many passengers walked into the city.

A big washout at White Spur, about seven miles west of town tore out a big piece of Santa Fe track and destroyed telegraph communication. No Santa Fe trains had either entered or left the union station at a late hour on Friday morning. The wrecking crew was at work on the break early in the morning, but, as the lines are down, no information can be had as to when the train, which was due at 8:40 a. m., will arrive.

On the Southwestern a washout of both track and telegraph line, has stalled the train from the east. The train scheduled to leave this city at 7:50 a. m., is still in the yards.

A washout near Anapra on the S. P., stopped the train due at 6:55 a. m. from the west, and tying up the 8:20 a. m. and 6:55 a. m. for the west. The wires are down. No trains will arrive from the west until late Friday afternoon.

**River Rises Again.**  
Another big rise in the river has again flooded the Washington park district near the wireless station, and is rising to the danger point in the Foundry addition.

A record of the rise in the Foundry addition shows that from early Friday morning to 11 o'clock the river at that point has risen over 18 inches. This puts the water line almost up to the high water mark of last week. One adobe house, that has been vacant, has so far fallen and another rise will bring down quite a number that are at present just touched by the water.

Many of the buildings of the Texas Oil company are standing in water, but as the foundations are of cement, only a prolonged standing of water at present level will damage them.

**Wireless Under Water.**  
At Washington park the water is standing nearly three feet deep around the Paulson wireless house and completely flooded large tracts. A new family, named Hertz, has been flooded.

**ROYALISTS PLAN TO  
INVADE PORTUGAL**  
Lisbon, Portugal, July 20.—By way of Badaioz, Spanish frontier, July 21.—An invasion by Capt. Couciers, at the head of the royalist forces, appears imminent. All attention is now fixed on the north. The Portuguese monarchists possess thousands of rifles of the latest pattern, smuggled from Galicia, Spain, from Germany and Belgium and also many field guns and Maxim's.

The monarchists remain on the Spanish frontier, conspiring openly against the republic. Nevertheless, the continued assurances of the Spanish government, the Royalists daily hold military drills and practice in the large private estates and among the hills of Galicia.

Confidential opinion is convinced that the Spanish government is secretly protecting the Portuguese plotters in Galicia and the press has begun a bitter campaign against Spain, alleging bad faith.

The provisional government is anxious and censorship is strict.

**SANTA FE CUTS ITS

Largest Cantilever in World at Needles, Cal., Proved Unsafe.

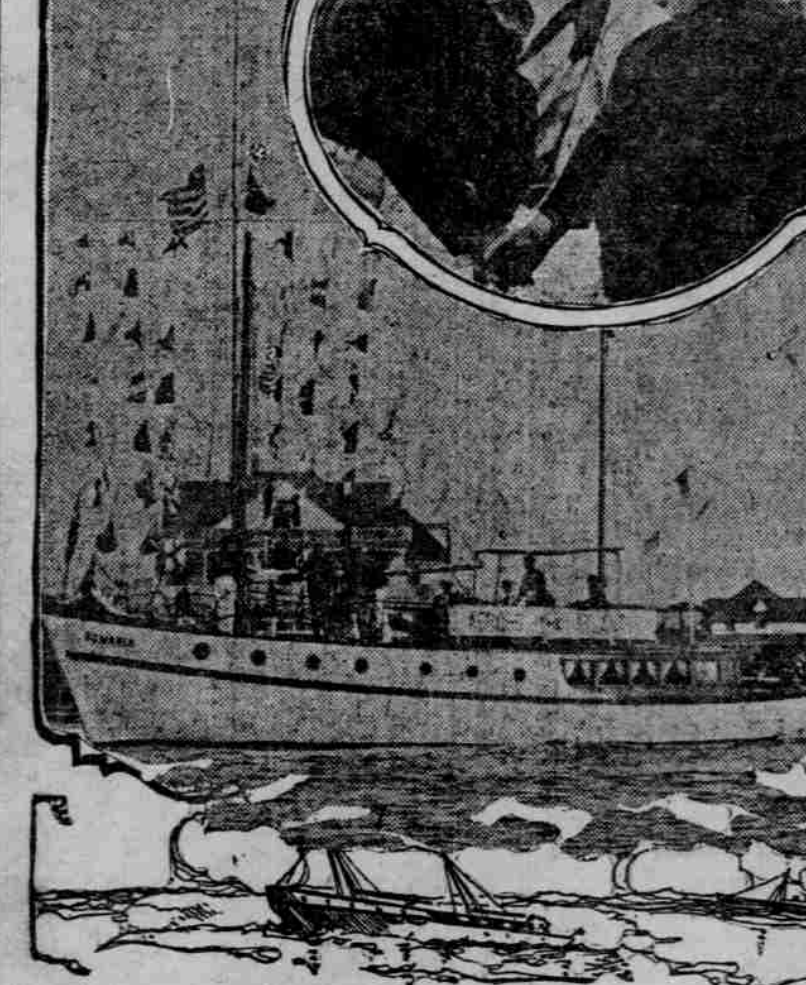

## WET CHAIRMAN CONFIDENT WHILE THE PROHIBITION LEADER LOOKS FOR LANDSLIDE FOR HIS SIDE—HUDSPETH BELIEVES WETS WILL WIN BY ABOUT 25,000—LOCAL PROHIBITIONISTS THINK 1000 DRY VOTES IN EL PASO WILL MEAN STATE VICTORY.

Walters Claims State and Expects Landslide.

San Antonio, Texas, July 21.—Estimating the total vote to be cast to-morrow at 450,000, T. H. Ball, of Houston, chairman of the pro state organization, today predicted that the pros will carry the state by 55,000, and that the change of sentiment noticeable during the closing week of the campaign may result in a landslide which will give the pros a majority of 75,000.

**Walters Claims State and Expects Landslide.**  
Dallas, Texas, July 21.—J. F. Walters, chairman of the anti state-wide prohibitionist committee, declared today that the reports received from anti-prohibition leaders over the state show that Texas will give the anti-prohibitionists a majority of nearly 75,000.

Walters says he gives the anti-prohibitionists the benefit of the silent voting dry counties on this calculation, but he believes this class will vote the anti ticket.

**Wet or dry?**  
This political, not climatic, question is being asked by everyone, of every one in the hotel lobbies, or the streets, in the offices, banks and public buildings today. Saturday is the day when the electors of Texas will vote on the prohibition amendment to the constitution of the state. Keener interest is being taken locally in this election, than in any previous state election, and almost as much interest is being shown as in the results of the presidential election. Prohibitionists and anti-prohibitionists have been reduced to the vernacular of "wets" and "drys," and as such the two sides have lined up for the fight Saturday.

**Vote Will Be Heavy.**  
That the vote will be heavy and the election much closer than was expected is conceded by both sides. No more predictions are being made by the anti-prohibitionists that the state would carry for their cause by a majority of from 100,000 to 125,000. Senator Claud B. Hudspeth, who has been making speeches against the prohibition amendment in his district, returned Friday morning. He says that the majority against prohibition will not be greater than 25,000 in the state. This is a general opinion among the anti and some even predict a majority as low as 15,000 against the constitutional amendment.

The prohibitionists are claiming the state for their cause. George B. Oliver, secretary of the prohibition organization, says that the pros are expected to poll 1000 or more votes in El Paso county, which, he says, will be one-third of the entire vote cast. Should this prove true, he says, the prohibitionists will carry the state. This opinion is concurred in by the other prohibitionists and one man opposed to the amendment admitted Friday that if El Paso county cast one-third of the votes for prohibition it will carry the state.

**Larger Cities Are Anti.**  
It is conceded by both sides that the larger cities of Texas, including San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth, Dallas, Waco and El Paso will go against prohibition. This leaves the rural districts for the prohibitionists to show their greatest strength. North and east Texas is the stronghold of the dry element, both sides admit, and from this section a vote is expected that will have a large influence upon the final result.

**Says Personalities Help Wets.**  
The injection of personalities into the campaign has turned the tide in favor of the "wets," senator Hudspeth says. "They had us licked until 10 days ago," he said. "But they insisted upon attacking every speaker that opposed the prohibition amendment and in this way alienated a large number of voters throughout the state. The anti-prohibition cause will win tomorrow, I am sure from what I have heard and seen in my speaking trip. But the majority will be much smaller than many believe. I think 25,000 is a conservative estimate of the anti majority."

Much literature is being sent out by the prohibition organization in El Paso. Pamphlets containing the arguments of the prohibitionists are being distributed in the city.

## SMELTER TRUST NOT INVESTIGATION OF CHARGES DROPPED VIOLATING THE LAW

New York, July 21.—The investigation into the affairs of the American Smelting & Refining company, to determine whether the so-called "smelter trust" is in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law has been dropped.

United States district attorney Wise said today that he had investigated the complaints against the "smelter trust" and found them without foundation.

It was learned that the federal prosecutor received from attorney general Wickersham instructions to make an investigation of the American Smelting and Refining company and several officers of the company and books and documents pertaining to its business were before the district attorney.

It is understood that the matter came before the grand jury, which for an investigation, practically dismissed the complaint. District attorney Wise said today:
