## TWO O'CLOCK THE LIMIT

### Trainmen Give Roads to That Hour to Make Answer—Are Standing Pat.

(Herald Special.)  
Chicago, March 15.—After a conference today the trainmen announced that they would give the railroads until 2 o'clock to make radical concessions, and that if the roads did not comply that immediate arrangements to put the strike into effect would be made. President Carter, speaking for the trainmen, said that a telegram to this effect had been sent to Chairman Knapp and Labor Commissioner Neil at Washington. Carter said emphatically that the trainmen would not accept the plan suggested by the managers to have Knapp and Neil act as mediators, as he regarded the move merely a plan to prolong the controversy between the men and the roads.

If the word strike is given twenty-seven thousand firemen and engineers of forty-nine western roads will be effected, also effecting one hundred and forty thousand miles of track, with a monthly pay roll of \$160,000,000. Those directly effected by a strike order will be firemen, wipers, yardmen and others. President Carter of the trainmen says the men have finally made up their minds to stand pat, and that the issue is now up to the railroads.

**Roads Appeal to Knapp.**  
(Herald Special.)  
Washington, D. C., March 15.—The western railroads, threatened with a strike from the firemen, today appealed by wire to Chairman Knapp of the Interstate Commerce Commission and Commissioner of Labor Neil for mediation under the Erdman act. The request was signed by the general managers' committee in behalf of all the roads effected. The government mediators wired the firemen asking for their acquiescence, and a reply is expected from the latter this afternoon.

**Negotiations Pending.**

Philadelphia, Pa., March 15.—Negotiations looking to the settlement of the carmen's strike are still pending, and the situation is otherwise quiet.

## ROOSEVELTS ARE HAPPY HELD AS A CONSPIRATOR

Spent This Morning Autoing Over Khartoum—Colonel Wears Fresh Suit of Clothes.

Khartoum, March 15.—Colonel Roosevelt and Mrs. Roosevelt and Kermit, Miss Ethel spent most of today motoring about the city, visiting Gordon College and other places of interest. Roosevelt was attired in a fresh suit, and Kermit made the comment that his father looked like a gentleman for the first time in months. The family are extremely happy over the reunion, and are having a gay lark. Roosevelt said today that he did not know which was the harder task, struggling through the jungles or answering the demands made by his return to civilization. His mail is piled high, but so far he has made no effort to answer it. Loiterers follow the hunting party about begging for souvenirs of the big hunt. A small gathering is scheduled at the palace this evening. The Roosevelts occupy the choicest suite of the palace, being luxuriously furnished. The Roosevelts plan leaving here Thursday.

George Cannon is Arrested at Corinto, Nicaragua—Cousin to Leroy Cannon, Executed.

Corinto, Nicaragua, March 15.—Charged with a conspiracy against the life of President Madriz, George Cannon, aged twenty-five years and a cousin of Leroy Cannon, the American who was executed by President Zelaya, is held in the penitentiary here, where he was arrested. His identity became known this morning. He was formerly secretary to General Chamorro and claims that Chamorro led him to believe that Madriz was responsible for the death of Leroy Cannon. He was seeking revenge. Commander of the American fleet, Admiral Kimball, approved Cannon's arrest. Cannon has served various Central American governments under assumed names.

**SELECTING A JURY**

To Try Mrs. Tayler and Others For Murdering Banker Saylor.

Watska, Ill., March 15.—The examination of veniremen in the trial of Mrs. Lucy Saylor, Dr. William A. Miller and John Grunden on a charge of murdering Banker J. B. Saylor started this morning. An immense crowd thronged the court room and hissed the accused as they were brought from the jail into the court room. Mrs. Miller, wife of the accused doctor, sat next to Mrs. Saylor and chatted with her. During the proceedings Mrs. Saylor swooned, but soon recovered her composure. She says she is confident of acquittal. It is rumored that sensational allegations will be made by both sides as soon as the trial is under way.

**Child Smothered.**

Taylor, Texas, March 14.—When Mrs. Dora Wilburn arose from her bed in the James Gray residence in East Taylor yesterday morning to cook breakfast she left her 3-months-old baby boy sleeping. Returning to her bed chamber an hour afterward she found her infant babe dead. During her absence in the kitchen the child strangled or was smothered to death.

## EDITORS APPEALED TO

Republican Editors of Illinois, In Session, Are Asked to Stand By the Administration.

Springfield, Ill., March 15.—The Republican Editorial Association, in session here today, received a letter from President Taft expressing the hope that the editors will stand by the administration. Senator Cullum also wrote a letter to the editors, in which he praised the administration, including the new tariff bill and all that has been done, and admonished the editors that the greatest danger to the party was caused by the attacks from within the party. Senator Cullum also gave Cannon very warm praise.

**Big Athletic Meet In Gotham.**

New York, March 15.—The annual indoor games of the New York Athletic Club, to be held in Madison Square Garden tonight, attracted to this city today nearly a thousand athletes representing all the principal colleges and nearly all of the leading athletic clubs of the East. Interesting competitions in the various events are assured. Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Pennsylvania, Cornell, Dartmouth, Columbia, Princeton and other big colleges will be represented in the relay races. Another feature of the program that is attracting much attention is the special invitation run of one mile and a half between George Bonhas and John Tait, the Canadian record holder.
