SNEED CASE GOES TO JURY THIS EVENING

Fort Worth, Tex., Feb. 24.—The J. B. Sneed murder case will go to the jury tonight.

Attorney Wm. McLean Jr., who began speaking this morning, will exhaust his time at 3:30 o'clock, making the last argument for the defense. Attorney W. A. Hanger will close for the state and has three hours and a half at his disposal.

The trial has now been in progress 27 days, including three Sundays and one holiday, and the jury is beginning to show the effects of the long grind. Several of the attorneys also have been ill during the progress of the trial and unable to proceed.

Judge Harry Hendricks, of Amarillo, who was making an argument for the state at a night session last evening, was taken ill and court had to adjourn. One of the jurors fell rattapop yesterday afternoon and returned peacefully for half an hour, while a lawyer was speaking.

Judge Hendricks, the last speaker for the state, this morning asked for a verdict of first or second degree murder.

Wm. McLean Jr., speaking today for the defendant, asked an acquittal, saying that Sneed was the greatest home protector any country had ever seen or heard of, a scandalous remark about a woman from some rattapop young fellow, he declared, might not merit death, but when an old man of wide influence made such a remark, his gray hair ought not to protect him.

"We have heard all our lives," he declared, "that self-preservation is the first law of nature, but since I have been in this case I have reached the conclusion that the protection of the home should be the first law of nature."

MAIDEN LANE SCENE OF DARING BURGLARY

Great Jewelry District in a Panic Over Repeated Robberies.

New York, N. Y., Feb. 24.—Big jewelry houses in the Maiden Lane jewelry district are in alarm today over the announcement of another diamond robbery, which occurred some time yesterday in the heart of that supposedly burglar proof section of the city.

The watchfulness of the police and numerous private detectives who are constantly on guard there, the robbers gained entrance to the vault of the building at 13 Maiden Lane and walked away with a handful of gems valued at \$14,000 from the safe of Emanuel E. Rose, wholesale jeweler.

The burglars worked quickly and skillfully. They were compelled to use an explosive in getting to Rose's private safe, but no one has been found who heard the muffled explosion or suspected that anything was wrong. The jewelry board of trade has employed private detectives to run down the robbers, who are believed to belong to the same gang which executed another clever burglary in the same district a week ago.

HEADS ARE BROKEN IN TEXTILE STRIKE

Effort to Send Strikers' Children Away Causes a Riot.

Lawrence, Mass., Feb. 24.—Heads were broken today in a riot which resulted from an attempt to send 30 children of striking textile workers to Philadelphia, contrary to orders from the authorities. Police and military took the children into custody and arrested several persons.

BISHOP HENDRIX THINKS MADERO WILL ULTIMATELY PUT DOWN THE REVOLUTION

Distinguished Churchman Just from Interior of Mexico, Is Optimistic.

Bishop E. R. Hendrix, D. D., missionary bishop to Mexico of the Methodist Episcopal church south, who is in El Paso presiding over the 21st annual conference of the Mexican workers of the M. E. church, is of the opinion that the disturbance in Mexico will fall flat and that Madero will bring Mexico through the disturbance.

Bishop Hendrix has been holding conferences of the Methodist workers in Saltillo and Guadalupe, and went through to Mexico City before coming to the United States.

Bishop Hendrix considers our ambassador, Mr. Wilson, a better informed man on the condition of Mexico than any other person in the republic. He says that Mr. Wilson has a very favorable opinion of Madero and the men he has chosen for his cabinet, and believes that if given time the president will make good, as he has not yet had a chance to prove himself.

INSTITUTE IS NOW LEADING TOURNAY

Beats Y. M. C. A. in Cleverly Contested Game—Johnson the Big Star.

The "Y" did some good pass work, but lost out on the baskets.

DEATHS AND BURIALS

PABLO ALVAREZ. The funeral of Pablo Alvarez, who was stabbed about two weeks ago by an unidentified man and died Thursday, was held this morning from his residence on Santa Fe street. Interment was in Concordia cemetery.

J. C. WANLESS. The funeral of J. C. Wanless, who died Friday morning, was held this afternoon from the chapel at 508 Texas street. Rev. C. T. Dickey conducted the service. The body was buried in Concordia cemetery.

HINES SUES FUNK; ASKS FOR \$100,000

Suit Said to Be Outcome of Funk's Testimony in Lorimer Hearing.

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 24.—Edward Hines, the wealthy lumber dealer whose membership in the Union league club here was cancelled yesterday, today filed suit against Clarence S. Funk for \$100,000 in the circuit court.

Funk, who is general manager of the International Harvester company, testified before the senatorial committee in the Lorimer inquiry that Hines told him he had "put Lorimer away" and had requested that the Harvester company contribute \$10,000 to the expenses of the election of William Lorimer to the senate.

STORM DOES HEAVY DAMAGE ON COAST

Mobile, Ala., Feb. 24.—Much damage is believed to have been done to Mobile and surrounding towns by a storm that blew in from the gulf early today.

TO RESTORE FROM COTTON PROPERTY
