

**STOCK MARKET IS STEADY AT CLOSE**

The Clearing House Reserve Shows Decrease of \$6,501,600.

New York, N. Y., Feb. 24.—The stock market closed steady today. After an easy opening, substantial recoveries were made. Union Pacific selling above yesterday's best. Business was light, however, and probably represented short covering, rather than actual commitments. Prices shaded in the final dealings.

The statement of clearing house banks for the week (five days), shows that the banks hold \$29,373,370 reserve in excess of the legal requirements. This is a decrease of \$4,501,600 in the proportionate cash reserve as compared with the last.

**WHEAT EASES OFF ON WEATHER NEWS**

Buyers Get Busy In Corn Pit—Provisions Are Down.

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 24.—Wheat eased off today due to favorable weather. Opening prices were unchanged to 1/4 cent down. May started at \$1.09 1/2 to \$1.09, unchanged to 1/4 cent lower, and sagged to \$1.09 1/2 to \$1.09. Prospect of continued unsettled weather formed a decided buying influence in the corn pit. May opened unchanged to 1/4 cent off at 63 1/2 to 63 1/2, and then rose to 68 1/2.

There was not much pressure to sell oats. May started a 16th lower to a like amount up at 33 1/2 to 33 1/2, and ascended to 32 1/2.

Big receipts of hogs urged down provisions. Initial transactions varied from 3c decline to a shade advance, with May \$15.40 for pork; \$9.02 1/2 for lard, and \$8.55 for ribs.

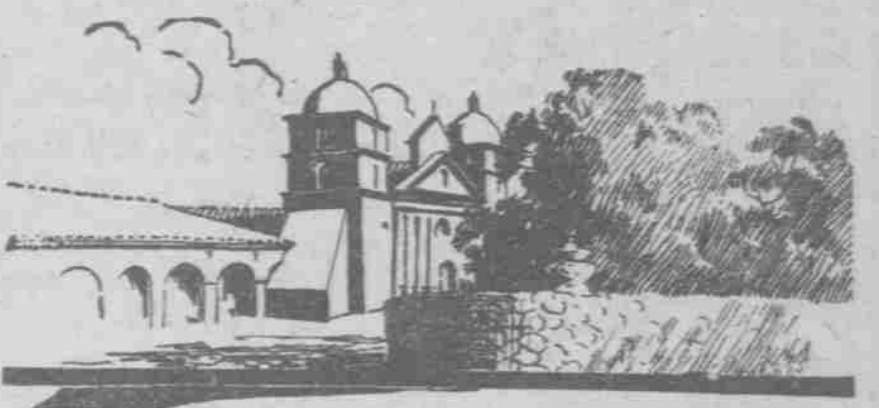

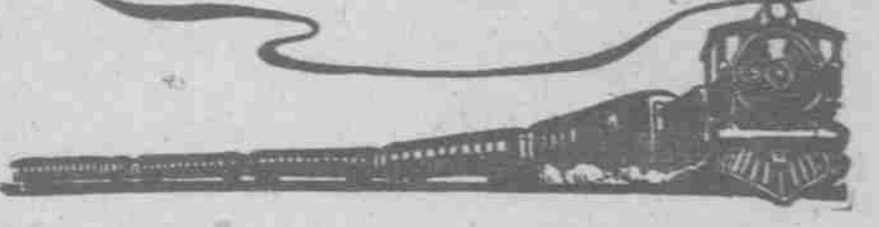
