PARTY FEELING HIGH. High Handed Methods and an Exciting Day in House.

BUTLER WAS UNSEATED. By the Republican Majority After Fierce Resistance by Democrats.

DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS AGREEMENT. Was Adhered To From the Outset But They Were Powerless.

CLIMAX WAS SEATING OF WAGONER. Who Received in the Election 650 Votes Less Than Butler—Means Death Knell of Many Measures.

Washington, February 26.—A dull scene which recalled the memorable and exciting days of the first congress, when party feeling ran freely and the hall of representatives resounded with denunciations of the alleged "high-handed methods" of the majority...

The vote was then taken on the resolution declaring Mr. Butler entitled to his seat. They were voted down—112 to 155.

After waiting an hour a quorum appeared and the previous question was ordered—137 to 12, with 28 present and not answering to their names.

The vote then taken on the resolution declaring Mr. Payne entitled to his seat was 112 to 155.

The speaker was able to count only 107 and Mr. Payne, the republican leader, moved a call of the house, the democrats forcing a roll call on the motion.

The reading of the journal consumed twenty minutes. At the conclusion of the reading Mr. Payne moved its approval, but Mr. Richardson demanded the reading of the bills and resolutions introduced yesterday.

Mr. Payne then received his motion to approve the journal, but withdrew it to allow Mr. Russell (Dem., Texas) to ask unanimous consent to correct the journal in regard to the vote he cast yesterday.

The previous question was ordered—134 to 52. Another roll call was forced on the motion to approve the journal.

Underwood changed his vote from no to aye, and after the amendment he entered a motion to reconsider.

Mr. Underwood (Dem., Tex.) then called up the contested election case of Waggoner vs. Butler from the Twelfth Missouri district, and Mr. Richardson raised the question of consideration against it.

Mr. Underwood, in charge of the case, then took the floor in support of the majority report, which recommended the unseating of Mr. Butler and the seating of Mr. Waggoner.

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Interested in his case. Neither of the Texas senators is actively opposing a favorable report from the Judiciary committee.

The Judiciary committee has some charges before it, however, and while no member of the Texas delegation is opposing them, so far as can be ascertained, the committee has been making an investigation, and, apparently, this investigation is not yet concluded.

Another Texas appointment talked of today was that of Harry Beck as postmaster at Hillsboro. R. M. Vaughan, an attorney of that place, is here for the purpose of opposing Beck's nomination.

Atlanta, Ga., February 26.—A special to the Constitution from Jackson, Miss., says: General John B. Gordon, commander in chief of the United Confederate Veterans, was taken violently ill while on board a Queen and Crescent train en route to this city from Clinton, Miss., tonight.

Washington, February 26.—The omnibus public building bill seems to be in status quo. It was not called up this afternoon.

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Washington, February 26.—Senator Bailey has taken a back in the matter of Representative Cooper's Sabine lake improvement bill, which is being held up in the senate by Mason of Illinois.

Washington, February 26.—A party which was introduced to the president by Representative Sims of Tennessee this morning included the following: James W. Stewart, Earl Warrig and Beaumont, and Mrs. Ryan of Houston.

Washington, February 26.—The continued eruptions of the volcano up to yesterday afternoon created an immense panic in all regions within twenty miles of the mountain, which cast by an immense quantity of lava and was plainly the center of a tremendous disturbance.
