NAVAL BILL PASSED

Carries with It an Appropriation of Over Eighty Million Dollars.

AN AMENDMENT ADOPTED Removing Restrictions on Secretary of Navy in Making Contracts.

THE LITTLEFIELD ANTI-TRUST BILL Suffered Another Defeat Upon a Motion to Take It Up.

MR. HOAR CRITICISED THE POLICY Of Attempting to Govern Distant Islands, as Pursued by the Present Administration.

Washington, February 27.—The senate today passed the naval and the military academy appropriation bills. The total carried by the former measure is \$81,007,412.

Mr. Blackburn secured a vote on his motion to take up the Littlefield anti-trust bill, but the motion was lost—28 to 38.

At the opening of the session Mr. Blackburn (Ky.) announced he would object to all requests for unanimous consent until the senate shall have an opportunity to say whether or not it wants to consider the Littlefield anti-trust bill.

The naval appropriation bill was taken up. Among the amendments agreed to was one removing the restriction, but upon the secretary of the navy that the four battleships provided for shall be of the general type of the Oregon and the two armored cruisers shall be of the general type of the Brooklyn.

An amendment by Mr. Nelson (Main.) was agreed to, providing that retired officers of the navy ordered to active duty shall have the rank, pay and allowances of officers of the active list of a like length of service.

An amendment was also agreed to appropriating \$5000 for the erection of a monument in Arlington cemetery, Virginia, to the memory of Captain Charles Goldiey of the United States ship Olympia.

Mr. Foraker offered an amendment, which was agreed to, providing for plans for the erection of a monument at Vicksburg military park to the memory of the gunboat flotilla operating in Western waters during the civil war.

The bill then was passed. On motion of Mr. Warren the military academy appropriation bill was taken up. The amendment providing for the appointment of a cadet from Porto Rico occasioned some debate as to whether or not the commissioner from Porto Rico should have the authority to appoint the cadet.

Mr. Foraker solved the question by offering an amendment inserting the words "to be approved by the president," which was agreed to.

The provision was further amended so as to provide that the cadet from Porto Rico shall be a native of that island.

Mr. Bailey (Tex.) said he desired to record himself against the proposition confining appointments to natives of any place.

When you want to stand up for the rights of carpet-baggers," remarked Mr. Hoar.

Mr. Bailey replied that he did not; that he had had an unpleasant experience with carpet-baggers.

Mr. Putt (Ala.) characterized the amendment as class legislation. Consideration of the military appropriation bill then proceeded. An amendment was agreed to amending the general staff law, providing that the chief of artillery shall hereafter serve as a member of the general staff and have the rank, pay and allowances of a brigadier general.

ADVANCE IN COTTON

Continues and Nully Predicts Even Higher Prices.

New York, February 27.—The excitement in the cotton market continues and 10¢ cents for spots was reached here today.

Some of the New England cotton goods manufacturers are inclined to take a gloomy view of the situation, claiming that they can not pay the present prices for raw cotton.

The strength and activity of the Liverpool market here has a good effect here. It is held that this influence about supplies in the hands of English spinners and that depleted stocks will have to be replenished.

Commercial Stability Dependent on a Fixed Monetary Standard. Mexico City, February 27.—The failure of the large French dry goods house known as Les Serravallo is said to be primarily due to the successive withdrawals of the partners taking out their capital and so weakening the concern.

Another dry goods concern is reported to make an assignment, but the opinion of bankers is that there is no reason to expect trouble in other houses whose capital has not been impaired by outside investments.

Military L. Meyer, president of the International Banking Corporation of New York, now here, says in an interview, that "it is of first importance to every great interest here that the money standard be not set on a fragile basis."

The men at the head of this nation are proving themselves wise and strong, and it is inevitable that there will be a solution to the questions of the hour that will be a credit to Mexico.

Earthquakes Reported at Several Points in Mexico. Colima, Mexico, February 27.—The volcano yesterday poured forth a quantity of white hot matter, but there was no outflow of lava till late at night, when great quantities flowed down the sides of the volcano.

Earthquakes are reported at Acapulco, Mexcala, Chilpancingo and Aguas Blancas. There was no alarm in this city over the activity of the volcano.

ON THEIR WAY BACK. United States Consul and Wife Afraid of Yellow Fever.

Guayaquil, Ecuador, February 27.—United States Consul General Sawyer and Mrs. Sawyer, who arrived here February 25, have started on their return to the United States on the same steamer which brought them to South.

Mexican Customs Duties. Eagle Pass, Texas, February 27.—Minister Lindheimer, by wire today, fixed a theoretical rate of exchange for calculating duties on imports into Mexico for March.
