

SECRET SERVICE HEAD IS WOMAN

Frenchman Found a Woman in Charge of Affairs; Gets a Tempting Offer.

Boulogne, France, Jan. 15.—The report that a woman is at the head of the German secret service department in the eastern zone, is revived in a statement published here from the pen of a Frenchman who says he was offered a position in the German secret service at Lille.

This Frenchman said he was a cigar merchant in Lille before the war, and after the German entry, made a good living handling cigars and cigarettes. Eventually he clashed with the German authorities and was compelled to abandon his trade. The German military officials, however, noticed that he spoke German fluently, and offered him a post as interpreter. When he reported for duty he was asked if he would not like to enter the secret service at \$4 a day and expenses. He replied in the affirmative and a week later he was taken to Antwerp in a military motor car.

Is Questioned by Woman. "At Antwerp I was taken before two officers," he says, "who were accompanied by a handmaid dressed woman. I soon discovered she was the most important person of the three. She questioned and cross-questioned me searching, and finally instructed me to proceed to Hasselt and other points in northern France to report on the progress of the secret service there, where they came from, and what was their condition. She concluded her talk by a tempting offer of money if I was able to secure any valuable information, supplementing this with a frightful picture of the fate that would befall a traitor.

Quite Job on Frontier. "She gave me \$15 for my expenses and directed me to report at Lorrach when I had finished my work. I left Antwerp and crossed through Germany to Switzerland, where I met the French frontier. I presented myself to a police official and told him my story."

TREASURY AGENTS SEIZE TWO GREAT DIAMONDS

New York, Jan. 15.—Two great egg-shaped diamonds, each weighing more than 15 karats and said to have been given centuries ago by a queen of Egypt, were seized Thursday by treasury agents from A. Apikadian, a resident of Constantinople, Turkey. It is claimed he failed to declare the jewels when he survived in the United States last October. The owner said he bought the diamonds in the jewelry market at Constantinople from an Egyptian prince who declared they had been in her family for centuries and had been worn at one time by the queen of Sheba. At the time of the purchase, he said, the diamonds were attached to two emeralds, one about an inch square, the other about a half an inch square. The emeralds, he said, were purchased by another dealer. No attempt has been made to fix the value of the diamonds. The owner has retained counsel to fight for possession of the diamonds.

PANAMA WIRELESS DESTROYED.

Sanchez, Jan. 15.—The canal zone police Thursday discovered wreckage plant on the top of a tall building in the heart of Panama. The plant was destroyed by the authorities who declared it belonged to a Danish West Indian negro, whom they believe was a student of wireless telegraphy. Complaint was made recently by the Danish minister, Sir Claude Mallet, of the existence of a wireless station in Panama, and he gave the police its approximate location.

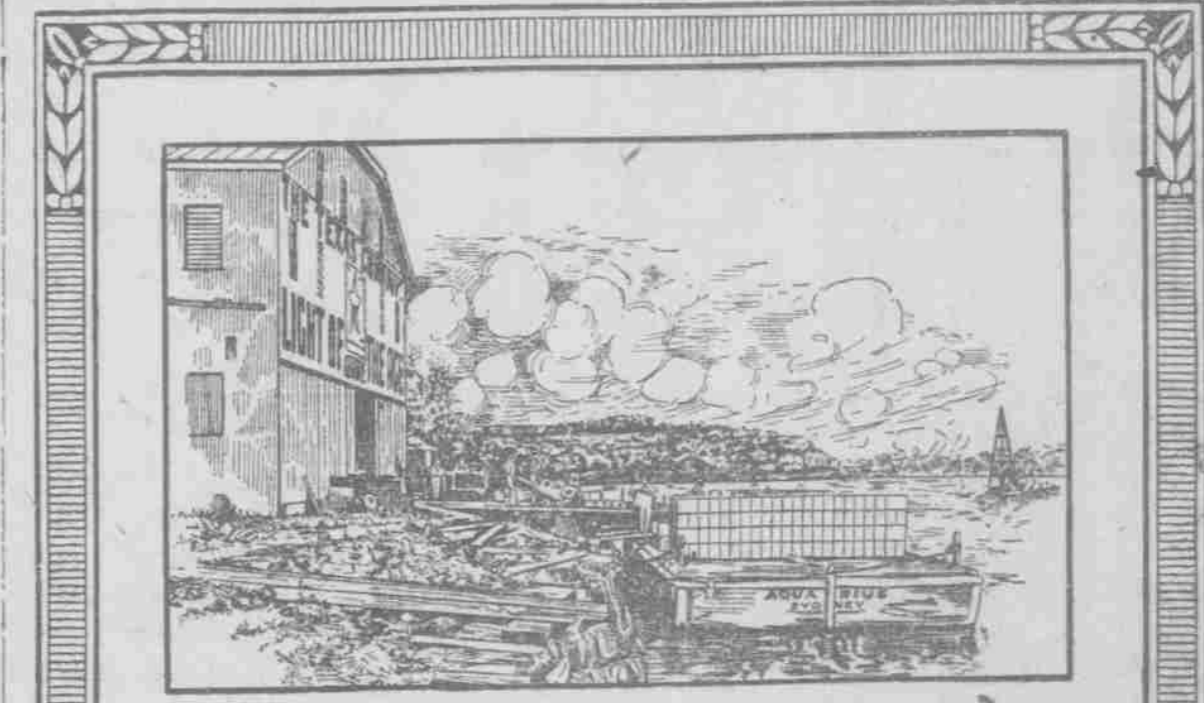
