MAVO RAID ROUSES ALARM

Admiral Winslow, Commanding Pacific Fleet, Is Ordered Southward.

GUNBOAT AND 2 CRUISERS NEARBY

Indians Again Loot Sugar Plantations and Factory, Killing Mexicans.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 24.—Admiral Winslow, commanding the Pacific fleet was ordered from San Francisco to Topolobampo, Mex., today with his flagship, the cruiser, San Diego, which will carry also 775 additional marines, ready to land to protect Americans and other foreigners.

The gunboat Annapolis already is at Topolobampo, protecting Americans driven from the sugar plantations by raiding Indians.

The cruisers Raleigh and New Orleans are nearby in case of need in less than a day.

The San Diego's trip from San Francisco will require about six days.

Indians Again Raid Los Mochis.

Despatches from Topolobampo have today of a new raid by Mayo Indians on the sugar plantations at Los Mochis, Nov. 20, in which several Mexicans were killed and several houses looted. The properties of the United Sugar company were not present a scene of desolation. All Americans are believed to have left Los Mochis.

Protection Inadequate.

It has been charged that the Carranza factory which is in control throughout the affected district, has been taking inadequate steps to protect foreigners. After the last, preceding raid on Los Mochis, a garrison of Carranza troops was promised, but never sent.

Garrison Commands Border Troops.

Secretary of war Garrison today made public a letter to Gen. Fuertes, commanding the border troops, in which he urged officers and men in the highest terms for their conduct during the recent critical situations on Mexican border.

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MITROVITZA, recently the Serbian capital, and Pristina, an important town on the eastern edge of the famous Kosovo plain, have fallen into the hands of the Austro-German invaders of Serbia, Berlin announces.

A Saloniki correspondent reports a defeat for the Bulgarians who had attempted a thrust movement to force the Serbians out of the Katchank defile.

German Occupation Village.—Renewed activity in the Riga-Dvinsk region is reported in the Berlin statement today. The Germans were forced out of an advance post in Janopol north of Hloakant, but declares they recaptured the village in a counter attack.

Collective Note to Greece.—The presentation to premier Skoufzou by the entente ministers of a collective note demanding that Greece at once define her attitude toward the recent developments of the Greek cabinet, members of which declared the situation had been decided according to an Athens message.

TROOP VESSELS REACH SALONKI

Paris, France, Nov. 24.—Telegraphing from Salonki, the Greek capital, the correspondent at Salonki, of the Havas news agency says: "Four more transports, heavily loaded with Greek troops, arrived in port this morning."

PREMIER SAYS GREECE MAY DISARM RETREATING ALLIES

Paris, France, Nov. 24.—Premier Skoufzou of Greece is quoted by the Paris correspondent as saying that if the allied forces in Macedonia retreat across the border Greece may disarm the retreating forces.

U. S. AND GERMANY STILL DIFFER ABOUT INDEMNITY

Washington, D. C., Nov. 24.—As a result of the latest conference between secretary of state Lansing and German ambassador von Bernstorff, it is known the two nations are still far apart regarding the method of settling for American lives lost on the Lusitania.

FORGE HIM OR PULL TRAIN; KILL HIM.

American Consul at Cananea Is Beaten By Drunken Villistas and Robbed.

FORCED TO OPEN THE BANK VAULTS

Obregon Is Outwitted By the Villistas In His Sonora Campaign to Dale.

DOUGLAS, ARIZ., Nov. 24.—Reports of Americans from Cananea are that all but one American there are safe, the unfortunate one being an engineer, Edgar Bean. He was murdered after the Villa commanders had forced him to aid in their flight from Cananea. The remains are due to arrive at Naco, Ariz., today.

Consul Is Beaten.

While only two American homes were looted by the departing Villa troops, all stores operated by the Cananea Consolidated Copper company were sacked, including the bank vaults, which contained several thousand dollars.

Obregon's Plans Fail.

Available Carranza official reports early today indicated the failure of his commander, combined with erroneous information, has resulted in a complete change in the plans of Gen. Obregon to crush the Villa forces in Sonora and end revolutionary rule in Mexico.

Both Factions Active.

In an interview, Gen. P. Elias Calles, at Mexcala, on the Del Rio and Nogales branch of the Southern Pacific railroad, in apparent ignorance of Rodriguez's movements, said he would be in Nogales within five days.

FAMILY OF BEAN, MURDERED ENGINEER, IS IN NEW YORK
