

FALTIM TO HANG
ASSERTS JONES

Arizona Attorney General Says Sims Can't Save Condemned Man.

Phoenix, Ariz., Nov. 25.—Attorney general Wiley Jones claims that at this late day neither the superintendent of the prison nor the prison physician has the power to save W. H. Falton by making affidavit that they believe him to be insane.

Insanity Plea May Save Him.

It was discovered yesterday that paragraph 1241, title 10, penal code of Arizona, reads as follows: "If, after the delivery to the superintendent for execution, there is good reason to believe that a defendant, under judgment of death, has become insane, the superintendent may call and such fact to the attention of the county attorney of the county in which the person is situated, whose duty it is to immediately file in the superior court of such county a petition, stating that the defendant is believed to be insane and asking that the question of insanity be inquired into."

The state board of pardons and paroles does not believe Falton insane, but has announced positively on several occasions that there shall be an interference, as far as the board is concerned, with the sentence of the court.

Attorney Files Affidavits.

Y. C. Struchmeyer, attorney for Falton, appeared before the board at an informal meeting Wednesday afternoon. He presented three affidavits from persons who had talked with Louis Beckton, one of the witnesses at the Falton trial, but did not succeed in changing the attitude of the board.

Kermann May Be Resisted.

It is probable that the execution of W. W. Kermann, now under sentence to be hanged December 10, will again be delayed. He was granted a stay of execution by the board of pardons in order that his sanity might be inquired into by a jury of 12, as provided by law.

Capt. Lear's Mount Makes Perfect Score in Horse Show Preliminary.

Rivalry is keen among the officers of the United States army for honors in the Horse Show which will be held at Washington park Friday and Saturday. The army officers have some of the finest mounts in the army and they have been working hard schooling their horses for the Horse Show.

Field Test.

The field test of the officers' chargers for the Horse Show was held Thursday morning at Fort Bliss. The ride of 10 miles had to be made in one hour and in the course were three jumps, two hurdles, three feet, nine inches high and one water jump of a ditch eight feet wide. The field test counts 40 points, the schooling test, which will be held Friday morning at Fort Bliss will count 20 points and the jumping test, which will be held at the horse show will count 20 points.

Y., and they are expected to reach here within the next few days.

All of the hotels served turkey dinners Thursday and there were many family reunions and dinners in homes of the city. At Fort Bliss and in Camp Cook, all of the soldiers were given turkey dinners Thursday at noon. The quartermaster department bought 25,000 pounds of turkey to supply the soldiers with plenty of turkey. The soldiers had little to do Thursday as all regular drills and everything else but the necessary duties were suspended for the day.

THANKSGIVING'S GENERAL HOLIDAY

Banks and Stores Close; Three Union Services; Baskets for Poor.

Thanksgiving day was observed in El Paso as a general holiday. The banks closed for the day, the postoffice closed at 11 o'clock and the remainder of the day, many of the stores remained closed throughout the day, while many more closed at noon.

Union Thanksgiving services were held at three churches while the church of St. Clement had the usual Thanksgiving service at 10 o'clock Thursday morning. The downtown union service was held at the First Baptist church where Rev. J. E. Abbott, pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian church delivered the sermon of thanks. Assisting in the services downtown were Rev. J. F. Williams of the First Baptist church; Rev. Perry J. Rice, of the Christian church; Rev. Charles Leslie Overstreet, of the First Presbyterian church; Rev. W. F. Packard, of the Trinity Methodist church; Rev. D. J. Wade, of the Calvary-Houston Square Baptist church and Rev. Herman G. Porter, of the First Methodist church.

Suburban Services.

The suburban union services were held at the East El Paso Presbyterian church and at the Highland Park Methodist church. At the East El Paso Presbyterian church Rev. J. H. Allen, of the Baptist church, delivered the sermon and was assisted in the services by the ministers of the city. At the Highland Park Methodist church Rev. W. C. Baber, of the Altura Presbyterian church, presided at the service. Special music was given at both of these suburban services and crowds attended these as well as the downtown meetings.

Army Service.

At the Sixth Infantry camp the soldiers held a Thanksgiving service which was in charge of chaplain John A. Randolph. The Sixth Infantry orchestra played appropriate music for the service and chaplain Randolph preached on "Thanksgiving." Special vocal music was also given at the service which was attended by hundreds of soldiers.

Baskets for Poor.

The Woman's Charity association distributed 40 baskets to the poor of the city Thursday as a part of its charity work. This is an annual custom and the baskets are distributed after a list is carefully prepared. The school children of the city contributed to these baskets by taking food to school. The Christian Young Men's society of the First Christian church also distributed baskets to the poor and many other baskets were distributed during the day.

Hospital Dinner.

The 107 inmates of the county hospital were given a turkey dinner with all the trimmings by superintendent McDaniel at noon Thursday. The dinner was complete as to all the trimmings. The nurses and members of the staff had their Thanksgiving dinner in a dining room reserved for their use. Many of the patients were too ill to partake of turkey, but superintendent McDaniel states that there was a splendid display of appetite among the old men and women of the poor farm section.

40 Short Termers Given Liberty On Thanksgiving

Forty short time prisoners at the city jail were released Thursday at noon by order of Judge Paul E. Thomas of the corporation court in observance of Thanksgiving day. The release is a usual Thanksgiving custom in the municipal courts of most of the larger American cities.

MIFADO PAYS HOMAGE TO MEMORY OF LATE EMPEROR

Kioto, Japan, Nov. 25.—Emperor Yoshihito, who paid a visit to the mausoleum of emperor Jimmu at Mount Utsunomiya, yesterday, proceeded today to Fushimi to pay homage before the mausoleum of the late emperor Meiji at Momoyama. The emperor and court journeyed to Fushimi by a special train from Kioto station, where huge welcoming crowds collected.

Only Two Boys Have Died Since

The remains of the late sovereign were interred at Momoyama and but one year later emperor Haruko, his consort, followed her husband and was buried beside him. Upon arrival at Momoyama station, the emperor drove to the mausoleum ground. Alighting at the foot of the hill he proceeded to the sacred precinct of the mausoleum. The crown prince and all princes and princesses of the imperial family followed his majesty and the whole court escorted the imperial procession.

The ceremonies being concluded

the emperor left the mausoleum and visiting the Eastern Mausoleum, prayed for the repose and happiness of the spirit of empress Haruko.
