

CARRANZA LOSES 1700 IN BATTLE

MEXICAN TRAIN WRECK KILLS 600

Engineer Loses Control on Steep Grade and Train Plunges Into Abyss.

Union, Mass., March 6.—Report of a railroad accident in Mexico in January in which 600 lives were lost is contained in a letter received today for the American board of commissioners for foreign missions from one of the representatives at Managuillo, on the Mexican Pacific coast.

According to the writer, after the center of the soldiers into Guadalupe, which was captured by Carranza on January 15, the governor ordered that the families should be brought up from Colima on a special train.

There were more than 70 cars, the letter continued, "amply packed with humanity, the roofs covered with men and women and many slung under the cars in a most perilous position, even for ordinary travel."

At the top of the steepest grade, coming down, the engineer lost control. The cars rushed down the long incline, throwing off human freight on both sides and finally plunging into an abyss.

Nine hundred people were on the train and only six were hurt. More than 600 were killed outright. Some of the Yagui Indians committed suicide when they were told of the accident to their families and others have avenged themselves.

All the railroad men were killed, so there is none to suffer.

Fight at Sayula Great Villa Victory, Says Report; Ojeda Joins Villa.

A total of 1700 Carranzistas were killed in the recent fighting at Sayula, in the Guadalupe district, according to an official report from Guadalupe received here by Villa officials. The report also states that the people of Guadalupe were ordered to the Carranzista that they offered Villa 10,000,000 pesos if he would sell them arms with which to fight Gen. Miguel Dieguez should the Villistas decide to evacuate the city. Guadalupe and the entire central portion of Jalisco is quiet, according to the report.

Ojeda Joins Villa. Gen. Pedro Ojeda, who, as a federal general, made a brilliant record in the defense of Xarco and later of Guaymas, has joined Villa at Guadalupe, according to reports received here. Ojeda has been reported captured and killed in battle at various times since Huera fled the country.

Oregon Wounded. The Villa report also states that Gen. Ojeda was wounded when the Carranzistas entered Mexico City, but that this has been kept secret.

GOZALES LEAVES MONTEREY AND WILL DEFEND TAMICO. Washington, D. C., March 6.—A dispatch from San Antonio, Texas, to the Carranza agency here Friday night stated Gen. Pablo Gonzales had left the city on Monday morning to continue the attack on Monterrey, and with the rest of his army, had withdrawn to Tamico to defend that port against any Villista attack.

GOOD SAMARITAN SHOT AIDING INJURED FRIEND. Thomas Chico is fatally injured and is at the new county hospital as the result of a gunshot wound received as he was accompanying Arcego Flores, an injured companion to the latter's home Friday night following a cutting attack from San Antonio street.

The shooting took place near 604 Broadway, the home of Flores. At the emergency hospital Chico stated that they were suddenly confronted by two unknown Mexicans. One of the men he stated drew a gun and fired. The ball entered the abdomen.

A short time before near the Paso del Norte hotel Flores and Chico and Gonzales engaged in a cutting affair. Flores says, Flores was cut about the face, but he was not injured. A murder was entered against Gonzales.
