

# TURKS TAKE ALLIES' TRENCHES

Constantinople, Turkey, May 6.—The Turkish war office gave out the following statement today:  
"An attempt of the enemy to land troops near Gaba Tepe, south of Ayl Bana, Tuesday, failed."  
"The night before last our troops attacked Scudal Bahr, in spite of a bombardment of the enemy's fleet and drove them out of their trenches, capturing three machine guns."  
"Yesterday the Russian fleet unsuccessfully bombarded the undefended village of Igheaden."

## TRAWLER AND SCHOONER SUNK BY SUBMARINES

London, Eng., May 6.—The trawler Stratton of Grimsby was sunk in the North sea Wednesday by the gunfire of a German submarine. The crew was taken aboard the submarine.  
The schooner Earl of Latham was sunk by a German submarine off Killybegs on the British coast. The crew was permitted to take to the small boats and was rescued by a trawler.

**WILHELMINA OWNERS PLEASED**  
London, Eng., May 6.—The owners of the American steamer Wilhelmina, according to the Daily Mail, have received what they pronounced to be a handsome and generous settlement by the British government, namely full value of the cargo at Hamburg war prices, which was more than double the price at English ports, as well as indemnity for delay, altogether approximately \$430,000. The original value of the cargo was estimated at \$150,000.

tacked the trenches of hill No. 69, occupied last month by British troops. There was a very heavy battle during which apoplexy gas made the Germans masters, in the beginning, of the position and they subsequently delivered counter attacks, and captured a portion of the trenches previously lost.

**Recover Lost Ground.**  
"In the forest of Alilly the counter attack delivered by us toward the end of the day made slight progress and we recaptured a portion of the position where the Germans had succeeded in gaining a footing in the morning. During the night the Germans delivered a counter attack against our position at Mamelon, to the east of Sillakawen, the summit of which they recaptured."

**Teutons Develop Strategy.**  
It is understood that strong pressure upon the retreating Russians has been exerted by the Austro-German forces. Mackensen and field marshal Baron von Hottendorf, which are advancing from the west.

# TAFT COMMENDS U. S. NEUTRALITY

## Mayor to Name Successor to W. E. Race Soon; Billy Smith Loses Place.

Madison, Wis., May 6.—William H. Taft, former president, addressing the Wisconsin legislature today, commended President Wilson for the policy of neutrality "which he has so conscientiously followed."  
Referring to the war, the former president said:  
"For a time we are enjoying a fewish activity in many branches of industry. We must take care that we are not overjoyed and misled. When peace comes some of this activity will be suddenly cut off with the sharpness of a cable dispatch. In our business affairs we must prepare for that change."  
"We have been criticized for the sale of arms and ammunition permitted under the international rules. The rule has always been that neutrals could not furnish arms and foodstuffs. As a nation, we should not place ourselves at a disadvantage and take an opposite view of this question. We are always unprepared for war. We must always expect aid from neutrals in case of war. It would be an unwise policy, in my judgment, for us to change this rule."

**HOT IRON FOR RHEUMATISM BURNS AGED WOMAN TO DEATH**  
Pueblo, Colo., May 6.—Mrs. Anna Mellicker, aged 74, was burned to death at her home, 1107 Pine street, this morning as a result of the application of a hot iron to her body for rheumatism. The iron ignited her clothing and she died in a matter of minutes, who had wrapped her in a rug in an attempt to smother the flames.

**NEW ROAD TO WILCOX TO RUN TRAINS IN JUNE**  
Phoenix, Ariz., May 6.—Notification has been received by the corporation commission to supply proper blanks for the filling of its tariffs and other data required by law. The new road is 15 miles long.

# JACKSON MAY GET WATERWORKS JOB

## Mayor to Name Successor to W. E. Race Soon; Billy Smith Loses Place.

H. P. Jackson is said to be slated for the position of superintendent of the city waterworks to succeed W. E. Race, who, it is understood, is to be let out by the new administration. The mayor and his councilmen went over the waterworks properties Wednesday and made a careful inspection of the mess pumping plant and wells, the pipe line and the downtown office of the water company. This is said to be preliminary to transferring the management. It was expected that the appointment of H. P. Jackson would be announced at council meeting Thursday morning but the mayor declared that he had not decided upon his selection for the head of the waterworks after council adjourned Thursday morning.

Mr. Jackson, who is believed to be in line for the place, is a member of the firm of Jackson, Winder & Dean, wholesale commission brokers. He was formerly head of the Jackson Grocery company on El Paso street and owns large interests in the lower valley. His selection is said to have been made because of his business ability.

**Billy Smith Let Out.**  
Billy Smith, Claude Smith and A. C. Letcher, city detectives, were relieved from duty Wednesday night. Mayor Lee, Thursday morning, announced the appointment of D. C. Zivley to the detective's department, taking the place of A. C. Letcher. Mr. Zivley will be in charge of the registration of women in the restricted district. While the taxing of the women had been abolished, an accurate record is to be kept of all women in the district.

**GEN. RUNDLE TO COMMAND ONE OF BRITAIN'S NEW ARMIES**  
London, Eng., May 6.—The chief command of one of Great Britain's six new armies will be held by Gen. Sir Henry Rundle, governor and commander in chief at Malta, according to an announcement in the Official Gazette.  
Two of the new armies already at the front are under Gen. Sir Douglas Haig, and Col. Smith-Dorrien, while another is in the operation against the "hardened" under Sir Ian Hamilton. Of those armies not yet in position, Lieut. Gen. Sir Archibald Hunter commands the first "kitchener" army, and Gen. Rundle and Bruce Hamilton the remaining two.  
Gen. Sir Arthur Paget has been appointed commander of the Salisbury training center.

**BRITISH COLONIES HOPE TO HAVE THEIR OWN NAVIES**  
Ottawa, Ont., May 6.—The hope that the day will come when Australia, New Zealand and Canada will have navies of their own sufficient strength to defend themselves was expressed Wednesday by F. M. H. Fisher, minister of marine and customs in New Zealand.  
Continuing, he said:  
"But let me say this abundantly clear, that we are all agreed that the wars of Great Britain are our wars and that upon the declaration of war our ships, personnel and equipment of war are as much a part of the British navy as though Great Britain had built and manned them."


**DANISH SHIP IS SUNK BY MINE OR TORPEDO**  
London, Eng., May 6.—The Danish steamer Cathax, from Copenhagen for Chinese ports, was either mined or torpedoed late Wednesday night in the North sea. She went down in 20 minutes. Her passengers and the members of her crew, totaling 43 persons, took to the small boats and all were landed safely at Ramsgate today.

**GERMANY FEELS LITTLE ALARM OVER ITALY'S ACTION**  
Berlin, Germany, May 6.—Germany's military advances east and west at this time are so important that little alarm need be felt over the possible advent of a third adversary, Italy, into the field, says the semi-official Lokal Anzeiger.

**GREAT BRITAIN RESTRICTS EXPORTS OF COTTON SHIRTINGS**  
London, Eng., May 6.—Great Britain has requested the government of Egypt to prohibit the export of cotton to all ports other than French, Russian, Spanish and Portuguese.  
Foreign secretary Grey informed the house of commons this afternoon that he expected the proposition to become operative very shortly.
