INTERNATIONAL BOXING UNION PLANS MEETING WITH MUCH APPROVAL

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—American boxing enthusiasts are awaiting with interest the outcome of the meeting of the International Boxing Union to be held in Paris on February 5. Unless there is an eleven hour shift in sentiment, the United States will not be represented formally, if at all. As a consequence it is doubtful if any of the amateur organizations of this country or the professional promoters will feel obliged to observe regulations or suggestions which may arise from such conference.
