

Great Britain Press Warns Europe Against Hasty Actions In Expelling Turks From Constantinople District

LONDON, Eng., Feb. 24.—Agitation in favor of expelling the Turks from Constantinople, which has been a conspicuous feature in one section of the British press, has had new days and which has had the support of religious and philanthropic bodies, met a counterblast from another section of the London newspaper world today, which contended the question was not one of such importance that it could not be settled on a sentimental consideration, but must be left to the military government of the province.
