CONFERENCE WAITS RED ANNOUNCEMENT OF TERMS TO POLAND

Five New Baltic Powers Invited to Take Part in Liberations for Settlement; Lloyd George Tells House of Commons Bolshevik Advance Slowing Up; Fierce Fighting Reported in Crimean Sector.
