OPERATION HOUSE.

Called Together. The Executive Board of the Knights of Labor of the State Assembled Here.

A Conference to be Had with President Sealey of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe.

When the trains arrived last night a number of Knights of Labor belonging to local assemblies were at the depot, and it was noticed that they greeted certain gentlemen who got off the trains, taking them in charge.

But little could be learned from the Knights in official positions as to the objects of the meeting, but, nevertheless, THE GAZETTE has reliable information to the effect that the board has been called together to confer with President Sealey to-day, probably at Temple and to adjust matters between the Knights and the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe.

It is stated that the Santa Fe people misunderstand the situation, that the Knights of Labor have no grievances, as far as they are concerned, and that the alarm of the company is without good grounds.

For several days the Santa Fe has received no perishable freight from our merchants, and a railroad man stated last night that no freight of any description was being received, and, certainly, that no freight train went out last night, as is the custom. This all points to the conclusion that the railroad company expects trouble, but the executive board will probably convince Mr. Sealey that his company is mistaken.

The passenger train on the Santa Fe which came in at 12 o'clock last night carried an extra express car loaded with heavy freight from Galveston for our merchants, and from passengers it was learned that all freight traffic had stopped along the road.

At Galveston no freight trains are either arriving or departing over the Missouri Pacific or Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe.

Our merchants will begin to feel this blockade in a short time, for they receive thousands of pounds of freight over the Santa Fe from Galveston.
