The Fort Worth Water-works company has filed suit in the county court against B. F. Dobson & Co., barbers, for the sum of \$230 due on fountain and bath room fixtures. J. W. Hall brings suit in the same court against C. W. Rintleman for \$94.20, due on bar-room fixtures.

A telephone message to THE GAZETTE from Weatherford last night stated that as Jas. M. Benton, fifty-five years old, was leaving that town last night, his horse fell and rolled over him, dislocating both of his shoulders. Benton was in a comatose condition at midnight but the physician thought he would recover.

Mr. J. M. Perry won a fine kit of tools at a raffle in Our Comrades saloon last night in the Third ward. The tools belonged to Wm. Doocy, a skilled mechanic, who was recently badly hurt by being caught under a falling scaffold, and the raffle was for the purpose of raising money to assist him while disabled. The lucky throw was forty-four.

The Methodist mite social at the residence of the Rev. A. A. Johnson was not largely attended, but enough were present to have a very pleasant time. A good discussion on the subject of prohibition was indulged in, and the male members appeared to be nearly equally divided. Deputy Sheriff John Thompson arrested a boy named "W. D. Orr" yesterday on the charge of forging a note in Colorado City. This is the only animal of the kind we have heard of in Northern Texas, though they are quite common in the vicinity of El Paso and in Mexico. BASE BALL.

Fort Worth Downs the Crack New Orleans Club by a Score of 5 to 3.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 30.—The Fort Worth club won their last game with the Bachs here to-day and gave one of the finest exhibitions of ball playing ever seen in the Crescent City. They are a fine lot of fellows and have played under difficulties ever since their arrival. CITY COUNCIL.

Action in Regard to the City Bonds—Other Business.

Yesterday Mayor J. P. Smith directed the city marshal to notify the different aldermen that there would be a meeting of the council at 10 o'clock a. m. Punctual to time appeared at the City hall Aldermen Alexander, Andrews, Adams, Field, Askew, Aldridge and Hughes and Mayor J. P. Smith. Absent, Alderman Richard Flanagan.

After the meeting had been called to order Mayor Smith stated that he had issued the call for this meeting in order that the council might take some action relating to the disposition of the last issue of bonds of the city of Fort Worth. After the certificates of stock in the water-works company were paid for \$22,000, there would still be left to be sold \$39,000 worth of bonds which he recommended that some arrangements be made as to their disposition. He did not think that they should be sold for less than par. It would cost \$2 per \$1000 to ship the bonds to New York, and he requested the council to take some action to defray the expenses incurred in registering the bonds at the comptroller's office, Austin, Tex., and the amount necessarily to be expended if the council agree to send the bonds to the financial agent of this city in New York.

Alderman Aldridge presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, that the mayor transmit to E. S. Johnson & Co., financial agents of this city in New York, the bonds of the city of Fort Worth representing the value of \$39,000 with instructions to place the bonds on the market for sale, the bonds to be sold at their par value.

Alderman Alexander presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, that the sum of \$10 be transferred from the cemetery fund to the bond fund, and the said amount is hereby allowed for the purpose of paying the expenses of registering the bonds at the comptroller's office in Austin, Tex., and expressing them to New York.

The following was then adopted when presented by Alderman Alexander:

Resolved, that citizens of the city be requested to number their houses in order to facilitate the delivery of mail by the carriers of the post-office.

The council then adjourned.

RAILROAD RACKET.

Building Improvements—The New School and Court-House.

Death of an Old and Respected Citizen—Ladies' Broom Drill.

HENRIETTA, TEX., Sept. 30.—In spite of the hard times so generally complained of throughout the state and nation our little city continues to grow and thrive. New buildings are going up in all parts of the city. W. S. Ikard has begun work on a \$12,000 residence in the southwest part of town near the handsome one of Tom Atkinson. The work is being done under the immediate supervision of J. A. Worsham, which of itself is a guarantee of elegance of style and finish. D. W. Williams has a very commodious and handsome residence well under way.

Work is progressing rapidly on our new court-house, and when completed the building will be a beauty, and the people of Clay county may well be proud of such evidence of their enterprise and public spirit. The contractors, Messrs. Strain, Risley & Swinburn, deserve great credit for the work they are doing. The architect, Mr. Wilson of Dallas, pronounces the work to be first class in every respect.

Our new school building is now ready for use, and if anyone wishes to see a model building let him visit ours. Conveniently located, elegantly and commodiously arranged, and an able staff of instructors already engaged. The people of Henrietta are justly proud of her public school, which is in every community a safe test of good citizenship and social enlightenment. Prof. Somers, recently from Cimco, is principal and Prof. Walpole, who taught the school here last year, Miss Olive Johnson of this place and Miss Kittie Ingalls of Archer City are assistants.

Under the benign influence of copious showers the grass is looking well and stock is in unusually good condition.

Col. J. R. Stevens of Gainesville paid us a visit on Wednesday of last week and shook hands with old neighbors.
