ceeding a short distance that the Democratic electoral ticket was not properly filed in and that there were clerical discrepancies or omissions, and on motion the whole district was referred to the committee on corrected returns.

Their Last Faith Hope is False.

New York, Nov. 12.—The Mall and Express this afternoon says: The official canvass of the vote in this state is in progress to-day. Few changes were made yesterday. It is now generally conceded that the vote of the counties above Harlem bridge cannot be changed to affect Cleveland's plurality.

An accidental error may entirely wipe out the plurality, and on this alone are based the hopes of the Republicans. At midnight 40 of the 60 counties had been heard from officially. They give a net gain of 32 for Cleveland, leaving his plurality at 1125, according to the claims of the Democrats. This practically ends all probability of any serious increase of Blaine's majorities in the rural counties, though it is fair to bear in mind that where gains are expected the canvass is delayed.

The real fight is in this city, and Republican hopes were greatly dampened when Ellis B. announced yesterday that he found the majority to be 45,291, wiping out the gain of 426 votes announced Saturday. The total number of votes upon which George Blaine intends to take exceptions to in the informal count already had is about four thousand. About one-third of these are defective or blank ballots and the rest are Butler and St. John votes which were miscounted, excluded or otherwise aided to swell the Cleveland vote.

A Republican Net Gain of Four.

New York, Nov. 12.—Only thirty-nine counties have reported the official vote up to 3 p. m. In Jefferson county Blaine gains eight. Blaine's total gains in thirty-nine counties are eleven votes. His total losses seven. All the Cleveland pluralities have remained unchanged. Blaine's net gain so far in the canvass has been four votes.

Three Blocks.

UTICA, N. Y., Nov. 12.—The board of canvassers of Oneida county adjourned yesterday until this evening on account of defective returns. The errors were clerical. The county clerk states that the figures will be as follows: Blaine, 13,798; Cleveland, 13,820; Butler, 159; St. John, 591; blank 3.

A Fair Count Being Made.

New York, Nov. 12.—The official canvass of twenty wards in Kings county shows a gain of thirty-nine votes for Cleveland and two for Blaine.

The board of canvassers of New York county examined the returns of the first three assembly districts today. Few differences from the press reports already published were discovered. Nothing was found that will materially affect Cleveland's plurality. It is estimated that Ottendorfer may fall 100 votes behind on the electoral ticket.

The board of trade and transportation adopted a resolution condemning the expressions of an inflammatory character in connection with the close contest, scolding the idea of fraud and asserting that every citizen will submit to the determination of the constituted authorities.

A Change in Favor of Blaine.

New York, Nov. 12.—A change favorable to Blaine of 233 votes in the Seventeenth election district of the Second assembly district was made by the board of canvassers in this county today, but on a careful comparison of the police and press returns, it is found that the difference will be made up in the districts to be canvassed.

The Country Won't Suffer Under An Honest Administration.

Troy, N. Y., Nov. 12.—Correspondents and reporters of the Troy Telegram have interviewed seventy-five manufacturers in the largest manufacturing towns of Northern New York on the effect of politics on their industry. Republicans and Democrats agreed that the election of Cleveland would have little effect in any of the manufacturing industries.

THE HUCKEY LEADERS OUT.

COLUMBUS, OHIO, Nov. 12.—A large Democratic jollification meeting was addressed to-night by Judge Thurman, Senator Pendleton, Congressman elect Oathwaite, Gov. Hoadly, Gen. Durbin Ward, Hon. Archy Mayo, and others. Letters were read from distinguished Democrats from all parts of the country.

VIRGINIA.

AN ALL-DAY CELEBRATION.

ALEXANDRIA, VA., Nov. 12.—The all-day celebration of the Democracy of this city in honor of Cleveland was the grandest affair of the kind ever had here. The procession was immense. After the procession 6000 people were fed at the barbecue. To-night the city was illuminated and there was a very large torchlight procession. Speeches were made by Gen. Rosecrans, Fitz Hugh Lee, J. S. Harbour, and others.

ALABAMA.

THE STATE LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Nov. 12.—The Democratic caucus of the house elected H. C. Armstrong speaker and D. W. Melver clerk. Both houses have organized. The governor's message is a state paper, which shows that the financial condition is good and the state institutions in prosperous condition. It refers to the flight of the late Treasurer Vincent, and says that great efforts were made to capture him, which all proved futile. It urges that the legislature be

prudent in legislation and rather deprecates the idea of reduction in the rate of the state tax. The university, Agricultural college and insane asylum have all been largely increased and their capacity is nearly doubled. Of the donation of 4000 acres of land for the benefit of the university more than half have been located. The schools have increased in numbers and efficiency from the increased appropriation of the last legislature. The blacks are getting their full share of the schools according to the population.

The Third Jollification.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Nov. 12.—The third jollification over Cleveland's election took place to-night. It surpassed anything in the history of the state. The streets were as bright as day. Cannon boomed. There was a torchlight procession of great length. Excursion trains were run in from all directions. Every speaker referred to the story told the negroes of their re-enslavement if a Democratic president were elected and strongly denounced such false words. Resolutions expressing strong Union sentiments were adopted.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

OFFICIAL CANVASS OF THE STATE.

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 12.—The official returns received by the secretary of state give the following as the result of the vote in this state: Blaine, 43,166; Cleveland, 39,166; St. John, 1573; Butler, 552. The aggregate vote was 84,457; Blaine's plurality, 4000; Blaine's majority, 1875.

Currier, Republican, for governor has a majority over all of 498.

MISSISSIPPI.

CLEVELAND'S MAJORITY 35,773.

JACKSON, MISS., Nov. 12.—Yazoo City and Meridian celebrated Cleveland's election to-night. The official vote of Mississippi gives Cleveland 78,547; Blaine, 42,774.

TENNESSEE.

A REPUBLICAN MAJORITY OF 539.

MEMPHIS, TENN., Nov. 12.—The official majority for Taylor, Republican, over Harris, Democrat, in this, the Tenth district for congress, is 539.

No Regular Time for Canvassing the Vote.

NASHVILLE, TENN., Nov. 12.—There is no regular time for canvassing the election returns in this state. They wait till they are all in. Bate's Democratic majority for governor is 6000.

The Democratic railroad commissioner is defeated. The legislature is Democratic by a reduced majority. Cleveland's plurality is about 12,000. The Republicans elect three congressmen from ten, a gain of one.

MICHIGAN.

43 COUNTIES HEARD FROM.

DETROIT, MICH., Nov. 12.—Forty-three of the eighty counties of Michigan report their official count and give Blaine pluralities of 13,353; the Fusionists pluralities of 6370. The remaining counties are evenly divided between the Fusionists and the Republicans, but the Republican plurality given in the figures so far reported will be cut down to four or five thousand.

The congressional delegation stands seven Fusion to one Republican.

GEORGIA.

NO SOLID SOUTH.

SAVANNAH, GA., Nov. 12.—Among the resolutions adopted at the great Democratic meeting last night was the following: "Resolved, that we will welcome the day when there shall be no solid South and no solid North, but a solid Union as it was eighty years ago, and when American citizens white and black, natives and adopted, at home and abroad, shall stand equal before the law and be covered and protected by our country's flag."

THE NINTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT.

CINCINNATI, OHIO, Nov. 12.—The official returns from the Ninth Kentucky congressional district show the election of W. H. Wadsworth, Republican, by a majority of 102.

DELAWARE.

CLEVELAND'S PLURALITY 4270.

WILMINGTON, DEL., Nov. 12.—The official vote of Delaware gives Cleveland, 17,054; Blaine, 12,778; St. John, 55; Butler, 4. The St. John and Butler electoral tickets were reported in New Castle county only. The temperance legislative vote was 1549.

CONNECTICUT.

DEMOCRATIC GOVERNOR ELECTED.

HARTFORD, CONN., Nov. 12.—Official returns to the secretary of state's office show that the Republican candidates for state secretary, treasurer and comptroller, voted for a week ago, have pluralities over the Democratic candidates of about 125 each. Waller, Democratic candidate for governor, was the only one on the ticket getting a plurality.

The legislature will have the choosing of the entire state ticket. The legislature is Republican.

CATTLEMEN'S CONVENTION.

First National Convention of the American Stockmen.

ST. LOUIS, MO., Nov. 11.—The long taked of cattlemen's convention will assemble in this city next Monday. There will be nearly nine hundred delegates in attendance and it is estimated that one thousand cattlemen from Northwestern Texas and Europe will be present. It will be the first time the stockmen of the entire country have met in convention. The chief object is by united action to obtain better protection for the cattle of the country. The organization will be one of means. Endeavors will be made to secure national legislation on the subject of contagious disease and thus prevent the conflict of authority existing in many states. Another important subject will be that of the international trail. The cattlemen desire the government to set aside for the trail from Texas to the British possession, 12,000 miles six miles wide as a trail for Texas cattle to the Northwest. Texas is now recognized as the vast breeding farm. Still other subjects will come before the convention, but these are the most important.

The Cooke County Official Returns—Business Transactions of the Chickasaw Council.

GAINESVILLE, TEX., Nov. 12.—The official returns of Cooke county as certified to by the county commissioners, show the total vote of the county to have been 4290. The number cast for short of the estimate by 800 votes. The total vote of the city was 1800. Ireland's majority in the county was 2702. Jones led Norton by 123 votes. At a recent meeting of the Chickasaw council in the nation the following items of business, of interest to stockmen, were transacted: The royalty on hay was reduced from \$1 to 50 cents per ton. A law was passed laying a tax on all stock driven through the territory as follows: All citizens and non-citizens driving stock through the nation shall pay a tax of 10 cents per head, and are required to drive not less than eight miles per day, nor deviate more than a mile each way from the main line of travel. The tax is to be collected by the collector of permits. Any citizen taking up stock dropped from any herd so traveling is allowed \$1 per head until the same is claimed. It is reported that the council recently passed a law prohibiting hunting in the Chickasaw nation, and

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
