The Silver King to-night. Freight business over the roads running into Fort Worth is improving. Pickard were licensed to marry by the county clerk yesterday. The county court convened yesterday morning, but no cases came up and the jury docket was laid over until to-day. Capt. Wm. Bell of the Texas & Pacific, is happy over the advent of a fine ten-pound boy at his residence, on West Broadway. The furniture house of J. K. Ezell & Co. was moving yesterday into the store on Houston street lately occupied by Messrs. I. Goldberg & Co. The driving park was bought in by the stockholders yesterday at a private sale, and an assessment will be made to pay the \$8000 mortgage held by Capt. Harrold. Two sheriff's sales occur to-day between the hours of 10 a. m. and 4 p. m., the Ramsey saloon and the confectionery stock of Leo Wenar being the attached property. The home of Mr. Bud Bosz, who lives near Birdville, was burned to the ground yesterday in the absence of Mr. Bosz and his family in this city. The loss is about \$1500 with no insurance. The Pacific Express company were transferring three lots of fine chickens last night, which were en route from the Star and Summit poultry yards of Waco to the exhibition at New Orleans. Col. A. H. Clark of Louisville and Col. Thos. Powers of Washington, D. C., who are prominently connected with the United States revenue department, were in the city yesterday inspecting the affairs of the department in this city. Warden Cummings, general superintendent of the Texas & Pacific road, was in the city yesterday morning, and in company with L. L. Keller, superintendent of the Rio Grande division, started west on a general tour of inspection along the line. THEATRICAL NOTES.
