The Cabinet.

If it is advisable to have the same books used in all schools of a county, the same argument may be used with greater force in favor of one system for the whole state; for, if uniformity is good, then the greatest degree of uniformity is best.

The bill of Mr. Yeager, to secure county selection of school-books, is objectionable from many points. It provides for a text-book committee for each county, composed of school trustees and teachers, who are to be elected by the teachers and trustees from each voting precinct.

A committee composed and influenced largely by school trustees, is not the most competent to select books to be taught in school.

The official or private citizen, who presumes to strangle or obstruct investigation into the management of public institutions, whether it be the university or the penitentiary, shows little respect either for the reputation of those charged with dereliction, or for the purity and success of civil government.
