The Security Markets Were Disturbed During the Week by Unusual Strength.

Sales and Quotations in Wool and Hides Markets—Yesterday's Sales of Railway Bonds.

No Reaction in Mortgages—General List of Stock Market Shows an Improvement for the Week.

WEEK ON WALL STREET.

Cotton declined four points. Oil opened at 75 and advanced to 76 1/2. The markets for securities during the week were distinguished by unusual strength.

In the stock market the coal shares were the great feature and advanced 7 to 12 1/2 per cent. The former for Reading and the latter for Delaware & Hudson.

GOVERNMENTS were very strong for the long-dated bonds, which made a further advance under active buying for the account of financial institutions.

RAILROAD bond transactions were larger and the market was very strong, showing generally decided improvement.

STOCKS were comparatively quiet with slight fluctuations until 1 o'clock. The coal stocks, however, were feverish and showed little more strength.
