Geo. Washington and Nathan Hale.

A Tale of the Revolution.

Washington's birthday! How many and varied are the recollections connected with that great name; more than a century has elapsed since the occurrence of those events which brought George Washington so prominently before the American people and made him one of the most notable characters of history.

Every one is familiar with the life of Washington, from those boyhood days when he was conspicuous among his associates in his fondness for all boyish sports and athletic exercises, excelling all his playmates in the sports of horsemanship and physical achievements, evincing even then, when he organized his companions into juvenile bands of soldiers, the germ of those military traits, which, in his maturer years, made him so successful a soldier and general.

Matthew Clinton remained in the British army until the close of the war and then returned to London. After spending a few days in the great metropolis of England he went to Clinton Grange, a manor house, situated on the banks of the Thames, three miles from London. This estate was owned by his uncle, Sir Henry Clinton, a retired baronet, who had inherited an immense fortune amounting to several hundred thousand pounds.

Matthew Clinton, this hour has come; repent and die. AT GALVESTON.
