Lang heard Chilton fall and say, "O, my God, I'm dying."

Chilton was placed with three bullets—two squarely in the back and one in the left side, showing that some shooting was being done by parties on outside of house.

As Chilton came around Dunn's saloon he was observed to stop, take accurate aim and fire. He told Lang that he had got Louis Bausman, but it turned out that he had shot and killed Jesse N. Sheets, a quiet citizen, who had no interest and was taking no part in the row.

His death, while accidental, was the saddest thing in this sad occurrence, as he leaves a wife and five little children, all under twelve years of age.

Sheets had peeped out his restaurant door to see the shooting and it cost him his life.

Gough, Emory and Bausman were put in jail immediately but Woodruff made his way out to Mr. Briggs, a couple of miles from town, where he now lies in a most precarious condition.

Emory's wound, while bad, may not prove fatal. The verdict of the coroner's jury charges that Ed King, Frank Valle and Fred Chilton came to their death by gun-shot wounds inflicted by Len Woodruff, Charles Emory, Louis Bausman and J. R. Gough of their malice aforethought.

It is of course impossible to give even a resume of the testimony which led the jury to their verdict.

Upon the finding of the jury, warrants for the four parties named were issued. Two of them, Bausman and Gough, upon preliminary examination, were bound over to await district court, and Emory and Woodruff will be examined as soon as their wounds admit.

One Salie Henry is also under confinement as an accomplice to the murder of King, Valle and Chilton.
