It is very unjust to the remaining members to tell half the story. Bleat it out, man, and let us hear who he is!

Settle the Country. It is strange that while the state government is settling some method of detection into the affairs of the nomads of the prairies, they do not conclude to pass laws that will settle the country and organize civil government therein. If the West was settled and local government instituted, there would be no need of state "rent agents," state detectives and state rangers. A little more attention to the settlement and a little less attention to ways and means for its government would result beneficially to all concerned, including the school tax-payers.

Divide all the Western territory into counties thirty miles square, as the Panhandle is divided; attach the unorganized to the nearest organized county for judicial purposes; put all the lands on the market at not more than \$2 an acre; sell to each actual settler four or five sections; do away with the complexity in securing title from the state; repeal the lease law and invite home-seekers to come; then people and civil government will take the place of cattle ranches and rangers, and there will be no need of inquisitors, detectives and other odious legal machinery. Wrong in principle and a failure in practice, the lease in fact leads to other infamies.

Statesmanship. When the land bill was returned to the house with the senate amendments, a lively discussion ensued over the question of concurrence. As a sample of the statesmanship, practical acquaintance with the needs of Texas and knowledge of the West which arrays itself at Austin in favor of a lease law, we append a few of the "arguments" used by the lease advocates in urging concurrence in the senate amendments:

Mr. Ponder replied in favor of concurrence in the senate amendments. He thought the pasture men were going to take the West anyway, and it did not make any difference whether one man or a dozen leased the whole country.

Mr. Crane argued that the large leases were confined to unorganized counties, while the settler hunted the organized counties.

Dr. Camp of Limestone said the actual settler in the West was a joke. He could not go there, or, at least, he could not stay there. He wanted laws enacted without regard to the actual settler, as there was no use of quarreling about him.

Mr. Woods of Kaufman declared that the cattlemen would have complete control of the West in ten years, and he wanted to squeeze the living grease out of them while they were acquiring it. He favored a vigorous lease law.

Mr. Jones of McLennan advocated the grass commissioner. He seemed to like it chiefly because the freegrass men opposed it.

Now, here is a question vitally affecting the welfare of by far the largest portion of the state, and, to a less, but by no means inconsiderable, extent, the welfare of Texas. And these are the sober, serious arguments of men who were elected to make laws for the people! If statesmen talk so, is it any wonder that the press, having less individual responsibility for legislation, should treat the subject as it does? Or, is this alleged statesmanship the fungus growth of a misleading press? Some of these "arguments" read more like the dogmatic paragrapher who insists that "free grass" means only free range for a rich cattleman, than like a statesman in search of the true land policy for a state that has enough public land to provide homes for more than a half-million people.

Upon the land policy of the state depends in large measure the growth and development of Texas. We have heretofore escaped the evil effects of financial depression and short crops

because of the money brought into the country by land buyers and railroad builders. More than ever Texas needs to sell land now. A land policy that shall attract, not deter, immigration will not only sell state lands and people the frontier, but it will facilitate private sales. The settlement of the country will produce more revenue to the school fund than the leasing of the lands. There is no more important subject of legislation than the disposition of the public lands; and yet men are in the legislature who discuss it in the manner reported. Poor old Texas.

LAMPASAS.

A Negro Church Burned—The Water-Works Question Settled. LAMPASAS, TEX., March 26.—For the past three days it has been cold and misting rain, the slight frost of Tuesday morning did no damage.

Tuesday night near midnight the negro church, situated in East Lampasas, nearly a mile from the square, was destroyed by fire, supposed to have been the work of an incendiary. Our city is on wheels. A skating rink was opened last night, and will, no doubt, continue during the season. Considerable agitation has been had the past few days over the location of the water supply for the water-works. Some of our citizens protested against the action of the council, and at a public meeting a committee of three prominent citizens was appointed to confer with a like committee of the council. The meeting of the committee yesterday resulted in the approval of the city council's action and the work of promoting the water works goes on. Mr. F. O. Brown, of Fort Worth, the contractor, is in the city arranging for the laying of the mains, locating the engines, etc.

Petitions pro and con are being circulated in regard to the placing of criminal proceedings under the jurisdiction of the county court, which with our present population, seems to be necessary. Many improvements are making for the accommodation of the expected summer visitors, who will be entertained royally this season. The Globe Hotel has built an addition of three stories, and now has a capacity of nearly seventy bed-rooms.

ALBANY.

Stockmen Preparing to Raise Feed—Building Improvements. ALBANY, TEX., March 26.—The weather has been cloudy and cold since the 20th, with an occasional rain. Grass is growing rapidly and a few days warm weather would turn all kinds of vegetation green.

Mr. Swenton, the New York banker, has shipped to this point twelve spans of his fine Kentucky mules, to be used in plowing and seeding a portion of his large ranch in Jones county. Preparations are making by all of our stockmen to raise feed this year. This will revolutionize the system of handling cattle in this portion of Texas. Heretofore cattle were obliged to "rustle" for themselves and their owners calculated a certain per cent. of loss, but now there seems to be a determination to feed and grade up their cattle.

Mr. W. R. Moore is building a handsome residence on Jacobs street. It is two story, with all, bay windows each end and Queen Ann roof. Mr. Moore is one of our enterprising cattlemen and believes in enjoying the comforts of life.

B. W. Rose, late of Dallas, has purchased the entire interest in the two-story stone business house on East Second street, facing the court square, and is remodeling it preparatory to receiving a large stock of goods.

The large, two-story bungalow on Main street, west side of the square, will soon be completed, this will be the largest business house in the town when completed, being 29 by 125.

A car-load of fine Jersey and Holstein cows has been sold here this week. Several of our citizens are visiting at New Orleans. A large number expect to make the trip next month.

C. P. Alexander is building a residence and business house combined on North Main street. Some of our citizens are canvassing the probable success of an immigration society at this place. This would be a commendable enterprise and deserves more than a passing notice from those interested. Our county has never been properly advertised and now would be an excellent time to organize an immigration society.

Some discussion is heard relative to the quarantining laws of Kansas and New Mexico, and the probable effect on cattle to be driven up the trail. No satisfactory conclusion seems to have been reached, on the contrary, quite a diversity of opinion exists among the cattlemen as to results.
