XIXth LEGISLATURE.

The Senate Stands by Its Amendments to the Land Bill-A Conference Ordered.

The Prohibitory Amendment Passed to Its Third Reading in the Senate by a Vote of 10 to 7.

The Bill Cutting Up Tom Green Lost-The House Kills the Commission of Appeals.

THE SENATE. MORNING SESSION. Special.

AUSTIN, TEX., March 27.-In the senate this morning, Mr. Kilgore from the committee on constitutional amendments reported favorably the house joint resolution increasing the number of supreme court judges to five.

Mr. Calhoun introduced a bill to reorganize the Thirty-fifth judicial district.

The senate refused to recede from its amendments to the land bill and Calhoun, Davis and Terrell were appointed a committee of free conference on the part of the senate.

The juror bill pending yesterday was passed by a vote of yeas 13, nays 10.

The house bill changing the time of holding courts in the Eleventh judicial district, was passed.

The house bill to require county commissioners to give \$2000 bond each, was lost.

The house bill amending the law so as to require all justices of the peace to give bond, as such was passed to its third reading.

The house bill relating to the collection of taxes in unorganized counties was passed.

The house bill dividing Tom Green county into six new counties was lost.

The senate bill to reorganize the Thirty-fifth judicial district was passed.

The house bill making it a felony to remove or sell property or crops on which there are liens or mortgages was passed to its third reading.

The house bill to better protect fish and game was passed to its third reading.

Adjourned till 3 p. m. AFTERNOON SESSION. Joint resolution to submit a prohibitory amendment to a vote of the people was passed to its third reading by the following vote:

The house bill declaring sheriffs' offices vacant if they do not give bond within twenty days after their election, was passed to its third reading.

The senate bill to authorize county commissioners to furnish county offices and justices of the peace with books and stationery was passed to its third reading.

The senate bill reducing the maximum price of public printing was passed.

The house bill extending the time of working public roads to ten days each year was lost.

The house bill to protect persons in the settlement of public lands was passed.

The house bill to require the financial agent of the penitentiaries to give bond and providing for the appointment of a board of managers was passed.

The house bill to pay the reviewers of public roads for their services not to exceed \$2 per day was tabled.

The house bill increasing the penalty for selling liquors in local option precincts or counties was passed to its third reading.

The house bill providing how public roads shall be laid out was passed.

The house bill providing for obtaining transcripts of filed notes which have been lost or destroyed, was passed to its third reading.

The house bill providing that all lapsed railroad reservations shall be subject to location was passed.

The house bill amending the estray law was passed to its third reading.

The house bill making persons or sureties on indemnifying bonds parties to suits was passed to its third reading.

The house bill providing for the purchasing of court reports and hereafter to prevent the copyrighting of the same, was passed.

The house bill to prevent the gift or sale of deadly weapons to minors was lost.

The house bill to postpone the sale of property for taxes until July was passed.

The house bill providing that accounts shall be filed in the comptroller's office before he shall issue warrants on the treasurer was passed.

The house bill detaching Shelby county from the Fourth district was lost.

Adjourned.

THE HOUSE. MORNING SESSION. The house this evening rounded off its record in favor of civil service reform by killing the commission of appeals, making the fourth department of the government it has lopped off this session. This fight has been going on for weeks, and at first the friends of the commission had almost a two-thirds majority.

Meets. Combes of Dallas and Jones of McLennan, two of the oldest lawyers in the house, have been engineering the attack on it, and so skillfully have they cast their anchors to windward that to-day they had an easy victory.

Mr. Crane of Johnson fought manfully for the commission, but only Mr. McKinney of Walker came to his relief.

The first blow at it was an amendment by Mr. Jones, making it expire within one year. This was adopted by a majority of one, and then by a vote of 15 to 31 the house flatly killed the commission.

of the school lands. This bill provides a penalty of from \$200 to \$1000 and from one to six months' imprisonment for intimidation of the settler.

Authorizing commissioners' courts to designate as election precincts not over four justices' precincts in unorganized counties.

Providing for the identification of surveys of land belonging to the school fund by new surveys under the supervision of the land commissioner.

The senate bill was passed requiring the attorney-general to institute suits against railroads organized under the laws of this state which have forfeited their charters under the constitution by consolidating with foreign roads.

The senate bill restoring the jurisdiction of the county courts of Bosque, Mason and Llano counties was passed to its third reading with an amendment striking out Bosque county from the bill.

The house refused to recede from its amendment to the bill to prevent hunting or fishing in the inclosed lands of another, limiting the inclosures affected by the bill to 2000 acres, and asked for a conference committee.

The senate amendments to the general appropriation bill were considered. The house refused to concur in the item of \$6000 for the summer normal schools, and also to the increase of the salaries of the \$1500 clerks in the comptroller's office to \$1500.

Several other minor amendments were rejected and others accepted. The differences will go to a conference committee.

EVENING SESSION. The granite scheme received what will in all probability prove its deathblow in the house to-night. Its friends made a pathetic appeal for the suspension of the rules in order that the bill might be taken up, but they were outvoted by 38 to 37.

As it is buried beneath about seventy-five senate bills on their first reading, there is not the remotest probability that it will be reached in regular order. Unless the house experiences a sudden and immediate change of heart, work on the new capitol will have to proceed with lilt.

The bill to prevent bucket-shop speculations in futures was engrossed. An amendment by Mr. Fisher to include cotton, produce and stock exchanges, offered to handicap the bill, was lost.

The following senate bills were passed: Giving county and justice courts rights to fore-close liens on real estate.

Donating the un-appropriated public domain to the school fund, and providing for the location of veteran and Confederate land certificates.
