THE OLD TICKET.

Slauter and Field Go in Again for City Physician and Recorder.

Marshal Bea Makes an Interesting Report of Police Matters and Asks a Larger Force.

The Mayor Appoints His Standing Committees for the Ensuing Year.

Pursuant to adjournment, the mayor and board of aldermen met at the city hall yesterday afternoon. Present: His honor, Mayor Smith, and aldermen Alexander, Field, Aldridge, Darter, Brownson, Daggett, Mulkey and Hughes. The meeting was called to order at 2 o'clock, p. m., Mayor Smith in the chair. The following proceedings were then had:

BIDS, PETITIONS, ETC.
Petition of H. Schwartz et al., requesting the appointment of J. K. Ashby as superintendent of water-works. Referred to committee on water-works.

R. L. Turner presented a bid to bury paupers for the city and convey sick paupers to the hospital, as follows: For burying paupers, \$11 00 each; for conveying sick paupers to the city hospital, \$1.50. Referred to committee on hospital and paupers.

The Blooded Stock and Livery association presented a bid to perform the same services as Mr. R. L. Turner, at the following rates: For burying paupers, \$12 00; conveying to city hospital, \$2.00. Referred to committee on hospital and paupers.

A communication was received from W. M. Res, city marshal, who states that during the fiscal year ending the 21st of March, 1885, the police force has been self-supporting from money received from fines assessed in recorder's court. That the total received into the police fund from this source during the year was \$18,226 34. That the pay of police during the same time was \$10,534 65. The expense of feeding city prisoners was \$1,508 39, and the other incidental expenses of recorder's court and calaboose was \$1,830 00, a total of \$13,973 04. The police had not been paid for the months of February and March; there was still of the expenditure of the last fiscal year \$1,211 53 due them as unpaid.

Called the attention of the council to the fact that the revenue from fines was amply sufficient to defray the expenses of a larger police force than that at present employed, and recommends that the ordinance creating the police funds which provides that this fund shall be used only to pay the police force, feed the city prisoners, pay expenses of recorder's court and the fire engineer of the fire department, be rigidly adhered to, and that hereafter none of this fund be diverted to other purposes. States that he has twelve officers under his control, which he does not consider sufficient as there is a large extent of territory to patrol.

Petition of Simon Hass et al., requesting the removal of the Fort Worth Street railway track on Jones street. Referred to street and alley committee.

Petition of M. T. Kerr et al., committee from members of the fire department, requesting that an allowance be made by the council to pay the expenses of Joe Mignon, a fireman, who was injured while in performance of his duties and has been confined to his room by sickness. Referred to committee on fire department.

Stuart Harrison, secretary of the Fort Worth fire department, forwards a resolution, adopted by the department, requesting that the city do not reduce the salary of the chief or drivers. Referred to committee on fire department.

Petition of G. W. Gillespie et al., requesting that the city grade and repair gutters surrounding block No. 109. Referred to street and alley committee.

Petition from Benjamin Bell et al., a committee from members of the fire department, requesting that the roof covering the Fireman's Central Hall be repaired. Referred to public building committee.

Petition from the Dairymen's Association of Fort Worth, requesting the appointment of a milk inspector, and recommending E. M. Wells for the place. Referred to board of health.

Petition from J. L. Parque, requesting to be appointed city scavenger, the salary of \$35 per month. Mr. L. Bar here stated that he would gather up and carry away all dead animals in the city limits cost-free to the city. Mr. L. Bar was immediately appointed city scavenger.

THE COUNCIL BALLOTS.
The applications of the following to be appointed city recorder were read by the secretary: W. H. Field, Jas. T. Melton, S. M. Freeman, Jas. S. Davis, D. S. Brown and A. G. McClung.

Alderman Mulkey presented an ordinance repealing ordinance No. 270, entitled, "An Ordinance Establishing the Office of Recorder."
Aldermen Darter and Mulkey both stated that they could not see how the salary of recorder could be reduced unless the office was abolished, as the salary had been fixed by ordinance for one year.

The vote was taken to suspend the rules and place the ordinance on its passage; the council refused to suspend the rules, the necessary two-thirds not voting in the affirmative.

The ordinance was then laid over under the rules, and the council at this time deferred action upon the selection of recorder.

The following gentlemen's applications were then read requesting to be appointed to the office of city physician: Dr. L. B. Slauter, Dr. T. Fitzhugh, Dr. C. G. Rely, Dr. I. M. Darter, Dr. R. M. Grammer. The vote for choice was ordered by ballot.

First ballot: Slauter 3 votes, Grammer 4 votes, Darter 1 vote.
The mayor decided that it required a majority of the votes to elect.
Second ballot: Slauter 4 votes, Grammer 3 votes and Darter 1 vote.
Third ballot: Slauter 5 votes, Grammer 2 votes and Darter 1 vote.

Dr. L. B. Slauter was declared the choice of the council for city physician for the ensuing year.
