TYLER.

Arrests in Van Zandt County for Running an Illicit Distillery. Special.

TYLER, TEX., May 2.—Our district and county clerks to-day moved into their new offices, which have just been completed. The offices have all the latest conveniences, including fire-proof vaults, and are as fine as any in the state.

Messrs. W. G. Gentry and W. W. Jones were arrested yesterday in Van Zandt county by Deputy United States Marshal Finch, charged with running an illicit distillery. They had a preliminary examination to-day before Judge Wood, United States commissioner, and were bound over to the next term of the United States court.

PANHANDLE QUARANTINE.

Trouble Brewing Between the Cattle-men of North and South Texas.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., May 2.—Trouble is brewing between the cattle-men of North and South Texas. The North Texas cattlemen propose to establish a quarantine against all the cattle south of the line of the Texas & Pacific railroad tracks.

A special meeting of the executive committee of the Southwestern Live Stock association, which is one of the largest and strongest associations in the United States, was held here yesterday with closed doors. The Panhandle quarantine was the subject of discussion. It is not known what action was determined upon, but a spirited southern cattleman said such a quarantine line as the one proposed could not be maintained even with the aid of Winchester.

SAN ANTONIO.

An Hungarian Nobleman Invests in a Texas Ranch. Special.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., May 2.—It is definitely settled that the depot of the Arkansas Pass road will be located on South Flores street. The proposition to use the lower part of the quarter-master's buildings at government post here or the barracks has been abandoned, and new buildings will be erected at a probable cost of \$150,000.

The Glynn-Turquans ranch, twenty miles west of here, was sold to-day to N. Ormay, a Hungarian nobleman. He came here recently from Patagonia by horseback. The election of officers for the new county of Valverde will occur in a few days. There are about eight candidates for each position. The number of deaths in San Antonio for the week was thirteen.

WINNSBORO.

Meeting of the Wood County Teachers' Association—Other Notes. Special.

WINNSBORO, TEX., May 2.—Our May-day celebration was a grand success. Every feature of the carefully arranged programme was presented in a manner highly creditable to all participating, and to the utmost satisfaction of the vast audience present. The coronation ceremonies at night were especially imposing, twenty-five beautiful young ladies and little girls participating.

The regular meeting of the teachers' association of Wood county was held here to-day. A very pleasing and instructive programme was carried out. The next regular meeting will be held at Quitman, May 30. Many prominent persons are in town, among whom we notice Ross Battle of the Quitman Mall, and Crockett Williams of the Mineola Monitor.

It is a conceded fact that the Marshall & Northwestern railway will be built to this place at no distant day.

A FLOATING CAPITOL.

The Seat of Government of West Virginia Removed to Charleston.

WHEELING, W. VA., May 2.—Wheeling is no longer the capital of West Virginia. The state archives, the government property and the officers and their families left this morning on the steamer Belle Prince and Chesapeake for Charleston, which, under the provisions of an act passed in 1879 by the legislature, became the permanent seat of government for this state on and after to-day.

This is the second time this city has ceased to be the capital. It was made such when the state was formed. At the close of the war Charleston became the capital. In 1875 Wheeling was made the capital again, the city agreeing to furnish quarters free of cost so long as the capital should be at Wheeling.

The steamers are expected to reach Charleston to-morrow night. The new state-house there is not yet completed, only a few of the executive offices being ready for occupancy.

TERRELL.

The City Assumes Control of the Water-Works—Fruit Crop. Special.

TERRELL, TEX., May 2.—At the last meeting of the city council the authorities resumed control of the water-works and they are now in charge of the water-works committee. The committee proposes to see that they are kept in good working order, that there is always a supply of water on hand in case of fire and that the hydrants are put at such a price as to come within the reach of every citizen of the incorporation.

Corn is beginning to suffer from the wet weather, but a week or two of fair weather now will enable farmers to place their corn and cotton in good condition. The fruit crop is heavy and the prospect is that the so much talked of canning establishment that we haven't got will be much needed.

R. Lowenthal of New Orleans has pitched his tent here and will engage

in the furniture trade. Our people give him a hearty welcome.

Dr. W. T. Childress, F. M. Keach, Dr. Webb and others who went to California some time ago, returned yesterday morning, delighted with what they saw and much benefited by the recreation afforded by the trip.

District Court.

E. W. Morton vs. Fort Worth Compress Co. was concluded yesterday, the court trying the case and rendering judgment for the plaintiff, but by request of defendant's counsel held up his final decision until Monday morning, to hear other authorities for defendant.

Jos. H. Brown vs. Western Union Telegraph Co., which has twice been tried in this court and as often reversed by the supreme court, was again called for trial, when defendant's attorneys, Stemmons & Felles, Dallas, filed affidavit for removal to federal court at Dallas on the ground that the defendant could not get a fair and impartial trial in this county, but the court, after hearing authorities, overruled the motion, and the case will again be tried Monday. Next in order was the habeas corpus cases, one of Howard Matlock, who stands indicted for murder of Mr. Youngblood in Arlington last winter. The court after hearing evidence remanded the defendant to jail without bail.
