DUCK CREEK, TEX., June 9 .- Our village is situated sixteen miles northeast of the city of Dallas, in Dallas county, on a stream by its own name. It is situated most beautifully on a high, rolling prairie, the soil of which is a mellow loam, well adapted to the cultivation and production of all the small grain as well as cotton and corn, the yield of which will compare most favorably with the older and more settled portions of Texas. The surrounding country is prairie, with an occasional group of trees along the creeks, which supply abundant and convexient water for stock in all seasons. The very best of water can be had for family use at a cepth of from twenty-five to thirty feet. Vegetation is unsurpassed and as fine vegetables can be had here now as anywhere. Potatoes, beans, peas, turnips and other garden truck too numerous for mention are grown successfully, as well as all the fruits common to this climate. A farmer reser here has peaches and apricots, and says fruit can be raised as successfully and with as little trouble as in any part of the country.
