THE STATE ENCAMPMENT.

The Features of the Last Day Were a Big Sham Battle and the Awarding of the Prizes.

The Seely Rifles of Galveston Capture the First Prize and the Belknap Rifles the Second.

LAMPASAS, TEX., June 27.—The exhibition and competitive drills having been finished yesterday, nothing remained to be done to-day except to fight the sham battle and award the prizes.

At 10 a. m. the forces were placed in position on the north bank of the Sulphur creek, opposite the parade grounds, between the Hancock springs and the city within the park grounds. Maj.-Gen. John M. Claiborne, commanding the first division, occupied a position near the park, with Col. R. F. Smith commanding a battalion composed of the Austin Rifles, the Fort Worth Rifles, the Navasota Guards, the Orange Rifles, the Artillery Light Guards, the Waco Light Infantry and the Galveston Artillery; Brig.-Gen. A. S. Roberts, commanding, G. N. Quintana, adjutant, and Capt. VanZandt, aide-de-camp.
The second division occupied a position near the Hancock spring, with Col. Turner commanding a battalion composed of the Belknap Rifles, the Lampasas Guards, the Seely Rifles, the Palestine Rifles, the Bryan Rifles and the battery of Crawford, Capt. Andrew of Houston commanding, W. G. Swain, adjutant, and Capt. H. Schul, aide-de-camp.

The battle was opened by the Battery of Crawford and a line of skirmishers advancing from division No. 2, which was responded to by skirmishers from No. 1. The action soon became general. The artillery from Gen. Claiborne's forces responded in grand style. After a short engagement in which the companies delivered their fire in various positions with considerable exhibition of skill, a lull in the firing from the forces of Gen. Claiborne was taken advantage of by the forces of Gen. Roberts, who retreated to flank the left wing of the enemy. This caused the support of the Galveston Artillery to be ordered by Gen. Claiborne to the support of his left wing. A charge by Gen. Roberts resulted in the capture of the Galveston Artillery, Capt. Forshey and one of his gunners escaping, riding on horse.
